Sowell First Negro in Md. Jr. C. of Commerce

LEONARDTOWN, Maryland—Frank U. Sowell, a native of Durham, and son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank G. Sowell has become the first Negro member of the Junior Chamber of Commerce in St. Mary's County, located in southern Maryland.

Sowell is a graduate of Hillside High School and North Carolina College of Durham. He is presently pursuing graduate studies at George Washington University.

As a student, he majored in Physical Education and participated in track, gymnastics, the dance group, Men's Steering Committee which he chaired, and other student activities.

Since becoming an instructor of physical education, he has received recognition as a track and basketball coach. During his years of coaching Sowell has produced district champions in basketball and state winners in track. His win and loss record as a basketball coach stands at 147-56, which was compiled in three different states namely, North Carolina, New York and Maryland.

Civically, Sowell works with the Youth Commission of St. Mary's County, Md. where he conducts an integrated recreational program which involves boys from 8-16. He also coaches an adult integrated basketball team competing for the League Championship.

Ingram, Field Representative from the North Carolina League of Credit Unions explained to those present the workings of a Credit Union and took the application for a Federal Credit Union Charter.
