Negro History And Library Aided by Deltas

WASHINGTON, D.C.—Public education programs on Negro life and history and the nation's performing arts were advanced this week when Delta Sigma Theta, a 45,000 member interracial women's organization, announced its latest public service grants.

In special ceremonies in Washington, D.C., Dr. Geraldine P. Woods of Los Angeles, Delta's national president, presented checks to the Association for the Study of Negro Life and History, the Omaha (Neb.) Public Library, and the Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts.

Recordings of former President John F. Kennedy and President Lyndon B. Johnson (then vice-president) addressing the sorority's Golden Anniversary meeting were also presented to the oral history archives of both the Kennedy and Johnson Libraries.

Dr. Charles H. Wesley, executive director of the Association for the Study of Negro Life and History, accepted Delta's 1967 grant of \$500 and the support of its 307 chapters in developing broader community understanding of the contribution Negro Americans have made to the nation.

The fund for the Delta Sigma Theta Collection of books on Negro life and history, located in the Omaha Public Library, now totals \$4,300, said Dr. Woods, in presenting the latest grant to Mrs. Alice Davis of Washington, D.C., who accepted the check in behalf of the Mayor of Omaha.

The women's public service organization was told by Edward Platt, Jr., special assistant to the chairman of the Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts, that it would be permanently memorialized as a donor to the nation's new cultural center as a result of its \$1,000 contribution.

Participating with Dr. Woods in the presentation ceremonies were Dr. Hilda Davis of the University of Delaware, chairman of Delta's projects committee, and Mrs. Hobart Taylor, Jr., executive director of the organization.
