Loyal Group Celebrates 1st Anniversary

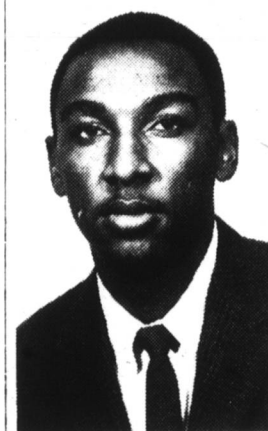
