has now embarked on a program of long-range assistance to Negro colleges.
Before joining the United Negro College Fund, Mr. Bryant was business manager of the Hampton Institute, in Virginia, for eight years. He also served in the field of business administration with Tuskegee

Institute, Tuskegee, Alabama; Johnson C. Smith University, Charlotte; Booker T. Washington Business College, Alabama, and Florida Normal College.
Mr. Bryant holds a master's degree in business administration from the Wharton School of Commerce, University of Pennsylvania. He is married and has three children.
In recent years, the Ford Foundation has become increasingly conferred with hprob-

lems of Negro higher education. Past grants include \$6 million to the United Negro College Fund, and \$13 million to thirteen Negro colleges in the South for scholarships and faculty improvement. In addition, the Foundation granted \$7 million to the National Merit Scholarship Corporation to establish a National Achievement Scholarship Program, under which about 200 scholarships a year are awarded to

promising Negroes to attend colleges of their choice.

At one of the regular meetings student nurses from Duke University gave talks and showed a film on Glaucoma. Attending the Forum were the following delegates: Mesdames Mamie Dawson, Bessie Doby, Flonnie Goodloe, Leila Graham, Julia Harris, Sadie Postles, and Addie Williams. Mrs. Doby was spokesman. 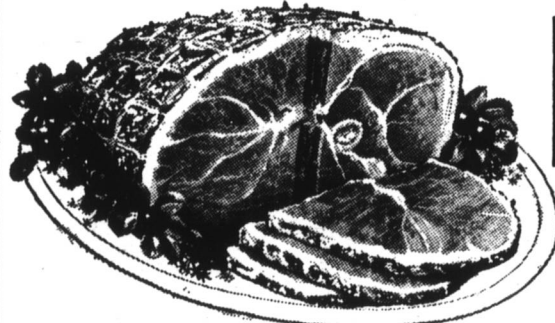
