ALOHA CLUB CELEBRATES FIRST ANNIVERSARY

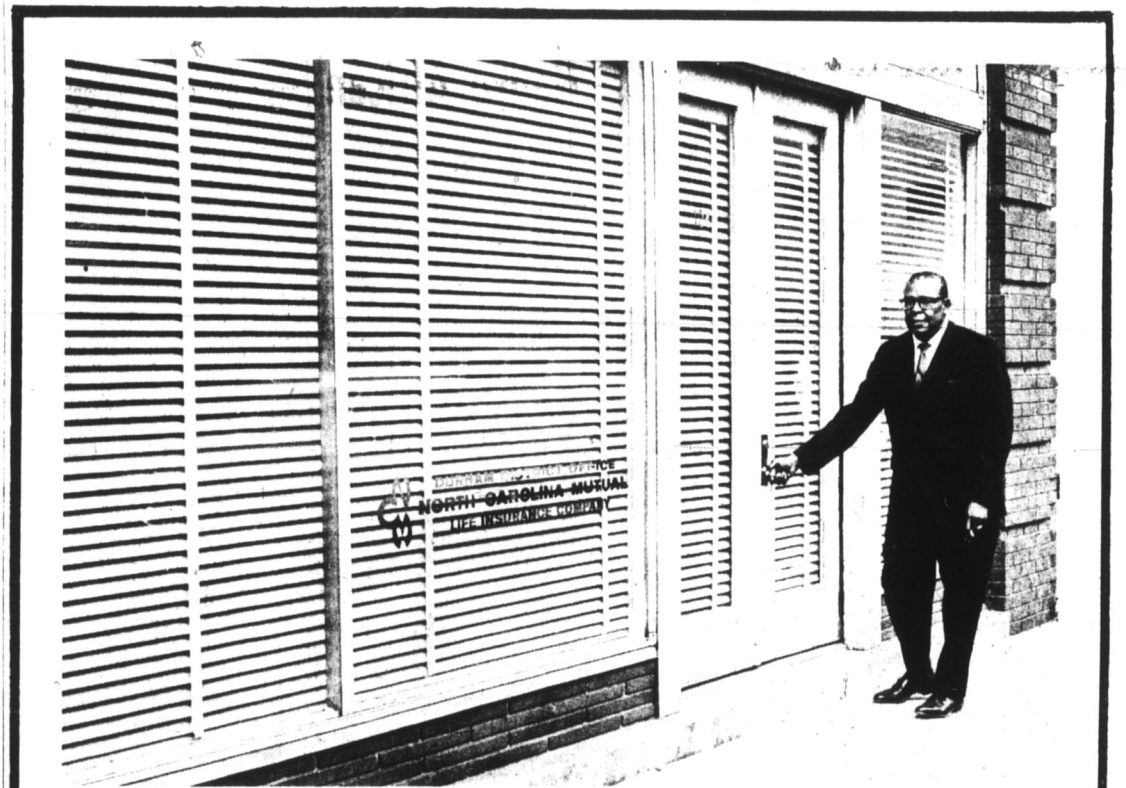
