North Carolina College Lose Opener to Allen Yellowjackets

COLUMBIA, S. C.—N. C. College's dreams of an undefeated grid campaign were shattered here Saturday when the Allen University yellowjackets handed the visiting Eagles a 27-12 setback.

Allen jumped to an early lead in the first period and

led all the way in completely dominating the inter-sectional contest.

THE YELLOWJACKETS drove 60-yards for their first marker. The drive was capped by William Chatman's one-yard plunge.

Allen added a safety and a touchdown in the second period. The safety came when N. C. College punter stepped out of the end zone on a fourth down punt attempt and the touchdown was tallied on Ulysses Young's 14-yard scoring sprint.

In the fourth period, George Kelly hauled in an eight-yard pass from Quarterback Robert Hamilton for Allen's third touchdown.

YOUNG THEN setup the final marker with a 65-yard scamper off his left tackle. Chatman banged over from the three and Kelly added the extra point.

North Carolina College capitalized on a blocked kick, late in the third period and a recovered Allen fumble to score its two markers.

Howard Matthews sneaked over from the one-yard line and Mose Bryant raced 15 yards for the second tally. A two-point conversion attempt, after the second TD, failed.

ALLEN'S defense limited the Eagles to only eight yards rushing while outgaining the Eagles in the air 191 yards to 40. In total offense, Allen garnered 251 yards to NCC's 84.

Defensive standouts for Allen were Tony Russell, Hank Dixon, Jim Wiggins, Jim Spencer, Bob Phillips, Carlton Taylor, Ernie Perkins, Frank Webster, Billy Nixon, Ralph Williams, McArthur Gray and Bobby Gray.

GREENSBORO — A&T State University has completed plans for one of the most impressive Homecoming weekends ever staged by the Institution.

"We are going all out to make this the best Homecoming ever," said chairman Dr. James Pendergrast.

Although the A&T-Maryland State football game on Saturday, October 14 will highlight the four-day celebration, a number of other activities have been planned for visiting alumni.

Events will get underway Thursday, October 12, at 8:00 p.m. when Miss Pat Mobley of Greensboro will be crowned "Miss A&T" in Charles Moore Gymnasium on the campus. The annual pep rally and bonfire will be staged Friday evening on the University's practice football field.

The Alumni Breakfast will be held Saturday at 6 a.m. in the newly-opened Red Carpet Room, plush dining facility.

A Homecoming parade, complete with more than a mile of floats, marching bands and campus beauties will get underway at 10 a.m. Saturday. A pre-game show featuring the A&T 140-piece Marching Aggies will be held at 1 p.m., half an hour prior to the football game.

The annual Homecoming Ball is scheduled for Saturday at 8 p.m. in Moore Gymnasium. The concluding activity will be the annual alumni Worship Service in the Richard Harrison Auditorium on Sunday, October 15, at 11 a.m. The Rev. Sampson Buie, who graduated from A&T in 1952, will be the speaker.
