Women Voters Slate Talks on Housing Mar 27

"Housing for the Disadvantaged: Some Alternatives to Public Housing" will be the topic for discussion at the meeting of the League of Women Voters of Durham Thursday, March 27, at 8:00 p.m. The public is urged to attend the forum which will be held in the auditorium at the YWCA on West Chapel Hill Street.

The program will begin with remarks from a panel of four speakers. W. Hausler, architect with Cogswell, Hausler Associated Architects in Chapel Hill, will use pictures to illustrate his discussion of new designs, materials and techniques in building homes for low-income families.

The director of the Low-Income Housing Development Corporation, Walter Smith, will talk about government programs available to assist private builders and sponsors of housing for low-income families.

Floyd Fletcher, president of the Chamber of Commerce and one of the founders of Durham Homes, Inc., will talk about the business community's plans to alleviate Durham's housing shortage.

And Fred J. Herndon, Durham builder of both private and public housing, will discuss some of the practical problems in building homes for low-income families and some possible solutions.

Mrs. F. Hodge O'Neal, vice-president of the League and chairman of the organization's committee studying housing needs in Durham, will moderate the program. Comments and questions from the audience will be encouraged after the panel's remarks.

"We hope very much that the public will join us for this program," commented Mrs. O'Neal. "In 1968 17% of the estimated 40,800 dwellers in Durham City and County were rated substandard. 4700 of these dwellings have no plumbing any many have structural defects as well. This is one of Durham's critical problems, and we hope especially that builders, realtors, tenants and public officials who are so vitally concerned with the dilemma will come to hear the panel's remarks and contribute their points of view to the discussion afterwards."
