The program will begin with remarks from a panel of four speakers. W. Hausler, archtect with Cogswell. Hausler Associated Architects in Chapel Hill, will use pictures to illustrate his discussion of new designs, materials and techniques in building homes for low-inome families.

"In 1968 17% of the estimated 40,800 dwellers in Durham City and County were rated substandard. 4700 of these dwellings have no plumbing any many have structural defects as well. This is one of Durham's critical problems, and we hope especially that builders, realtors, tenants and public officials who are so vitally concerned with the dilemma will come to hear the panel's remarks and contribute their points of view to the discussion afterwards."


