Friday closed the junior activities with the annual junior class assembly. "Jam", a concert of the latest hits, was presented by some of the young, but famous junior vocalists.

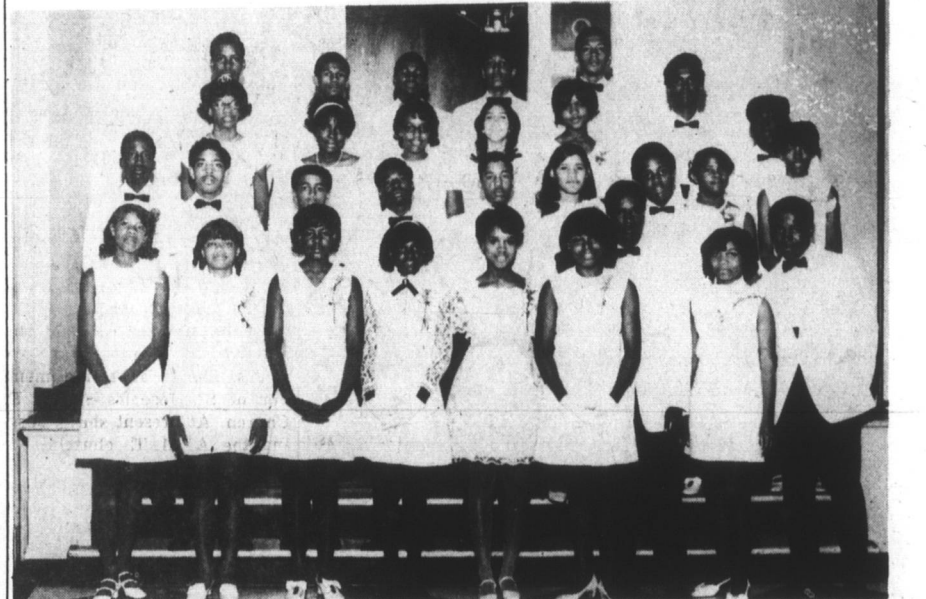

Broughton Renovation Is Approved

Plans for renovation of the Broughton High School auditorium, which was damaged by fire in February, were approved Monday by the Raleigh school board.

School officials have no estimate of what the renovation will cost, but insurance estimates of the damage were \$221,000.

Under the renovation plans, the basement floor will be rebuilt with classrooms, rest rooms and dressing rooms for the dramatic classes.

The first floor will be used again for an auditorium which will seat 758 people. A portion of the auditorium will be designed so it may be used as a separate large lecture room.

A second story over the auditorium will be a large instructional area which will seat 150 people.

An official completion date will be set later, after a construction contract to re-do the building has been awarded, but the renovation is not expected to be completed in time for next fall's school opening.

The board also gave the go-ahead for forming of plans for a stadium at the new Sanderson High School.

Supt. Conrad Hooper said the stadium will be put in the natural basin on the northwest side of the school building.

The stadium will be constructed in portions. Bleachers on one side will be the first priority, Hooper said.

Tau Gamma Delta Presents Annual Taugadetta

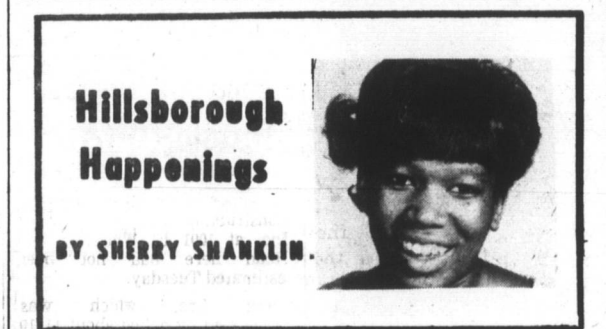
"Stars of Tomorrow" was the theme for the talent program presented recently as a preliminary feature climaxing the crowning of "Miss Taugadetta" of 1969.
