**VSC to Begin Program to Aid Fall Dropouts**

PETERSBURG — Beginning in September, Virginia State College will try to salvage potential high school dropouts in Southside Virginia in a program called "Talent Search."

With the support of a grant of \$40,000 from the Higher Education Act of 1965, the VSC program will attempt to stimulate high school under-producers in Petersburg, Hopewell, Prince George County and Dinwiddie County to continue their education.

"Talent Search, a national project, concentrates on youth who have been traditionally neglected by the educational system. Or as Edward L. Smith director of the VSC program said, "Emphasis is placed on the extremely keen academic student or the youth who is talented athletically—seldom on the youngster who has talent in other areas."

With three full-time and two part-time staff members VSC's Talent Search project will pick 10 VSC students in the fall who will be put on work-study assignment with a small income. These 10, who come from disadvantaged backgrounds, will be trained by staff counselors and then go into the Southside Virginia area.

They will work with high school counselors, parents and potential dropouts to encourage these youngsters to improve their present work and plan for advanced education.

"While most products of our educational system may need some help at one point or another," Smith said, "this program is directed specifically to those of educational, social and economic deprivation whose need is acute and continuous."

Smith commented that the "high crime rate, illegitimacy and unemployment in our society today often result from undeveloped talented youngsters," and hopefully the VSC project would combat the root causes of these social maladies.
