"The Mini-Bike Menace" in NC Is Growing

RALEIGH - What safety officials and many private citizens are referring to as the "mini-bike menace" is growing in North Carolina.

According to Motor Vehicles Commissioner Joe W. Garrett, his department and local enforcement agencies are receiving an increasing number of complaints about the small vehicles being operated by children on the public streets and highways. He said a number of children have been killed in the state while operating mini-bikes and reports of injuries are mounting.

Garrett said the mini-bike becomes a full-fledged motor vehicle when it ventures onto a public street. As such, it is subject to all motor vehicle laws.

"The operator," he said, "must be a licensed driver. The vehicle must carry a license plate, an inspection sticker and be fully covered by insurance."

"Our primary concern, of course is the safety of the children who operate these vehicles. They simply cannot be seen on the streets by automobile drivers."

The Commissioner expressed the belief that the solution to the problem lies, not in the wholesale arrest of youngsters for violating motor vehicle laws, but in the area of parental responsibility.

"In many instances," he said, "the children do not realize they are breaking laws. But, their parents do know the law and they should assume the responsibility for the actions of their children. By allowing their children to violate the law now, they are not only jeopardizing their lives, but, at the same time, they are encouraging them in disrespect for law that can carry over into later life."
