In 1943 the PTA sponsored 4,000 scouting units. Today the figure is 23,328 with over a million boys. Scouting helps the PTA to fulfill its national object. Five national objects of the PTA are (1) To promote the welfare of children and youth in home, school, church and community. (2) To raise the standards of home life. (3) To secure adequate laws for the care and protection of children and youth. (4) To bring into closer relation the home and the school, that parents and teachers may cooperate intelligently in the training of the child. (5) To develop every child the highest advantages in physical, mental, social and spiritual education.

The program of the Boys Scouts of America can help the PTA do its job because (1) Scouting brings boys and adults together. It supplements the home, school, and church and its program of training provides additional

values to the welfare of children and youth. (2) Parents enter into the scouting program enthusiastically. It leads to closer relationships. The promise of cub scouting, the scout oath and law of Boy Scouting, and the pledge of exploring aim at high standards of conduct in home and community. (3) Scouting encourages get-out-the-vote leading to positive legislation. Scouting supports the democratic ideal. (4) Teachers and parents find that scouting's broad program of action, fun and learning-by-doing creates attitudes of discipline and learning that are helpful in the proper education of boys and youth. (5) The activities and methods of scouting are aimed at mental and physical fitness, character development and citizenship training. Leaders in all walks of life acclaim scouting's accomplishments.
