**NC Educators Credit Union Holds Regular Meet**

The North Carolina Educators Credit Union held its regular meeting, Saturday April 24, 1971, 10:00 A.M. at the Credit Union Headquarters, 125 E. Hargett Street, Raleigh, N. C. The opening prayer was delivered by Mr. G. H. Washington.

Mr. C. M. McCall, Vice president presided for Mr. Jeffers the president who could not be present. Remarks by the chairman, we followed by acceptance of the last minutes. The Board considered the matter of delinquent loans, and ordered the Acting Treas-

urer to report to any legal means of collecting the same, with the application of the 2% per month charge being applied to all outstanding notes.

The Board reaffirmed its faith in the Century Club organization as the best way to create interest and participation in the credit union program and urged that all members become actively involved in efforts to reach the 500 membership goal by the deadline date or certainly by the annual meeting date.

All persons to whom Century Club Membership Certificates are presented at the annual meetings of the Club, on July 17, '71 will be considered charter members. Since the certificates are to be Prima Plaque Certificates, it will be necessary for you to send in your name as you prefer it being placed on the certificates, immediately to W. R. Collins, 125 E. Hargett Street, Raleigh, N. C. 27601. Your share deposits since January 1, '71 indicates your intention to comply with the certificate share saving requirement for membership in the Century Club. You may qualify for this charter membership in one of the following ways: 1. If your \$100 minimum or more has already been paid in shares. If the \$100. minimum amount that you are currently paying on or more is paid out on or before June 30, 1971. 2. If you are not paying currently on the \$100 minimum amount necessary for the Century Club Certificate, you can begin now and pay it or more out by the annual meeting date. If
