
Miss Edna Watkins Wed Saturday In Hillsborough

In a small number of cases monthly bleeding continues throughout pregnancy. (2) A woman can become pregnant during her period or right after her period, although this does not happen very often. Any woman who does not want to become pregnant should use a birth control method EVERY TIME she has sex-even during her period.
