## PREGNANCY PLANNING AND HEALTH

Dear Gloria: There are several questions I'd like to have answered: (1) Can a girl be pregnant and still have her periods? (2) Can a girl get pregnant if she has sex during her period, or the day after her period? (3) Do a girl and boy have to climax at the same time in order for the girl to get pregnant? (4) What are the signs and symptoms of pregnancy?

nancy? S.P.

Dear S.P.: Thank you for your letter. I'll be happy to answer your questions.

(1) It is not uncommon for women to have a period or two after they have become pregnant. Sometimes these periods are not as heavy as the woman's usual ones and

they are not necessarily regular. Sometimes women experience what is called "spotting"—or passing of blood, but not enough to be called a period, after they have become pregnant. In a small number of cases monthly bleeding continues throughout pregnancy.

(2) A woman can become pregnant during her period or right after her period, although this does not happen very often. Any woman who does not want to become pregnant should use a birth control method EVERY TIME she has sex—even during her period.

(3) A man and a woman definitely do NOT have to
