Women-In - Action Holds Meeting

With the theme "Women Forging Ahead Together for the Prevention of Violence and Its Causes," more than 80 women gathered at the Downtowner Motel on January 13, for the Women-In-Action Chapter Conference. Representatives came from as far away as Wilmington, despite the heavy snowfall.

Mayor James R. Hawkins, welcomed the visitors to the city and elaborated upon the many fine tasks that Women-In-Action has provided for the citizenry of Durham.

The purpose of the conference was given by the president, Mrs. A. T. Spaulding and Workshop leaders were introduced. Among the areas of concern discussed were Fund Raising, Information and Referral Services, Sub-Committees, Recruiting and Call for Action.

Still other areas presented were Methods to Organize Women-In-Action Chapters and What the Organization can mean to an individual and to a Community.

A luncheon highlight was the awarding of 1972 Volunteer Service Awards. These awards were presented to Mrs. E. R. Merrick for her work with the Black Braille Magazine and to Mrs. James H.
