### Your Clothes Perform Important Roles

**RALEIGH** -- Perhaps you've never thought about it before, but clothing plays an important role in our first impression of others. By the same token, if you meet someone briefly, you will be judged primarily on your appearance.

Therefore, you'll want clothing to speak well for you, believes Dorothy Barrier, extension clothing specialist, North Carolina State University.

When selecting garments, you may do well to remember that clothing performs seven roles, the specialist adds.

For example, a pleasing appearance is especially important at certain stages in life. Feeling that a person looks attractive can give a feeling of self-confidence.

Clothes can permit a person to use her imagination in selecting harmonious colors, textures, line and accessories that display that person's degree of creativity. Self expression or desire of creativity is the main reason for the increased number of home sewers.

Clothes can be a means of establishing one's identity by expressing one's choice in the style of clothes. This is often referred to as "style" of dress. Clothes should satisfy a person's inner picture of himself. Color, fabric and style can be used to create the desired appearance.

Clothing is a means of helping a person be independent and to make such decisions as: What shall I buy? What are the signs of quality? What shall I make? What pattern, fabric and color

April 28 is Keep America Beautiful Day nationwide. This day will be declared 'Keep Durham Beautiful Day' and will be followed by two weeks of extensive clean-up efforts throughout the community.

### IMPLEMENTATION OF PROGRAM:

The Volunteer Services Bureau office, 809 West Chapel Hill Street, Durham, will act as a clearing house for individuals to call or write to and notify of badly-littered areas in Durham. Groups and organizations are encouraged to volunteer their time to clean up areas in the city and county.

The Volunteer Bureau will coordinate Scout Troops to clean up littered areas and will assign other groups to combat unsightly areas in Durham.

The Sanitation Department will provide special curb side pick-up of trash and large, bulky items on two Wednesdays in May. The Sanitation Department will provide special containers at different locations throughout the city so that residents can dispose of trash in this manner. There will be full newspaper coverage of guidelines for collection of trash.

Garden clubs are asked to sponsor a school and encourage participation in the litter prevention program.

A number of civic groups, neighborhood community councils and rural community groups are being notified of the clean-up effort.

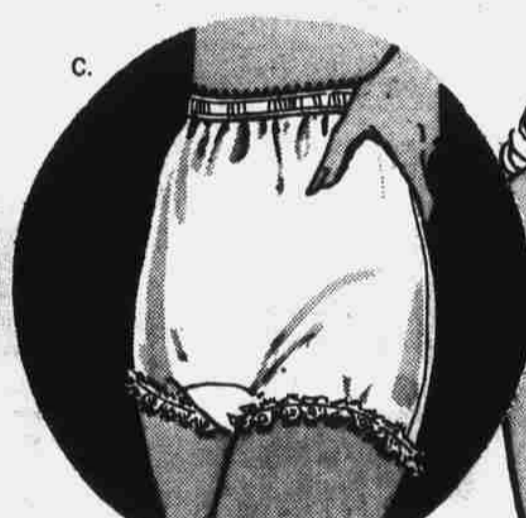
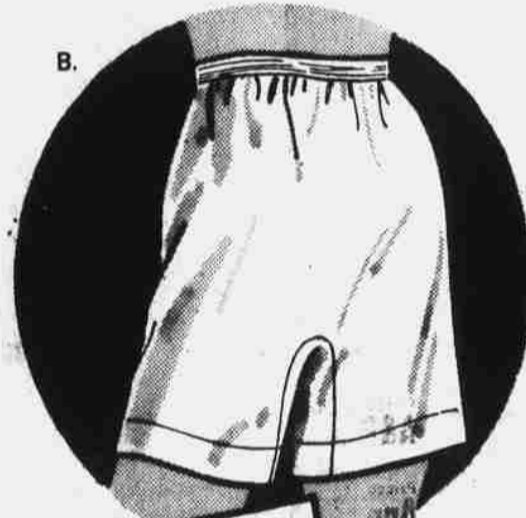
