In administrative positions in the local school system, more blacks in the police and fire departments, and more black employment in county offices and schools. The protestors also asked that Richard Satterfield, the band director, be reinstated.

Two weeks ago, more than 100 black demonstrators were arrested in protest sit-ins at Holmes High School and the county Board of Education building while protesting the dismissal of Satterfield. They were charged with failing to disperse when ordered to do so by police.

School Superintendent Edwin West said Satterfield, who had held his post as band director for 18 years, had been dismissed because of "incompetence" and his inability to discipline students.

However, Golden Frinks, North Carolina field director of the SCLC, charged the dismissal was due to racial discrimination and said the protest demonstrations would continue until Satterfield is reinstated.

The migrant health, family planning, public health training, research in health services and federal assistance to medical libraries would also be continued.

Another of the bills, provides for programs to aid the training of medical research scientists. The third bill sponsors programs for the development of better emergency medical services throughout the U. S.

"I think this shows the Congress does intend to place a higher priority on health than HEW (Department of Health, Education and Welfare) would," said U. S. Rep. Paul

Rogers, Democrat of Florida. Prominent figures in the industry have been especially harsh in their criticism of the President's recommended cuts.
