Ready to Retire?

Retirement. It's a big move—and each of us makes it differently.

Some settle back and slow down for the first time in their lives. Others look for new activity, dramatic changes, an exciting second career.

One woman I know—an ex-executive—turned to nursery school teaching. A salesman enrolled for his freshman year at his local community college.

But there's one thing we must all cope with when we retire: Change.

There's a change in income—perhaps a drastic one. So we must change the way we budget and spend our money.

We may change the place we live. Sell the house. Buy another or rent an apartment. Fit into a new community. Maybe adapt to another climate.

And obviously we face physical changes as we get older. Our bodies may need different kinds—and amounts—of food. This calls for a new approach to buying food, planning menus, cooking.

Managing all these changes is easier if you get organized and make plans. Here are a few of the questions you'll probably have to consider sooner or later:

- Exactly what income can you count on? Pension? Retirement fund payments? Social Security benefits? Income from investments?
- What expenses will you eliminate or cut back? Clothing, lunches, commutation? Perhaps your second car?
- What about health care? Do you have all the protection you need? Do you know exactly what Medicare offers?
- If you need additional income, could you find and handle a part-time job? If you're unable to work, do you know what help is available through Federal, state, local programs? Have you checked with your county government concerning old-age assistance, Medicaid, food aid programs?

• Would living be easier, pleasanter, cheaper in another part of the country? Have you compared various communities' services for older people? Check, for instance, special rates on buses and at theaters as well as local social services.

If you need help answering these questions, you may want to look into these booklets published by the Federal Government. They can be ordered from the Superintendent of Documents, Government Printing Office, Washington, D.C. 20402. (Make checks or money orders payable to Supt. of Documents.)

1040 U.S. Individual Income Tax Return Taxpayers Ask IRS

This column of questions and answers on federal tax matters is provided by the local office of the U. S. Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by taxpayers.

Q. My wife and I are going to purchase one U.S. Savings Bond each month for my son's college education. Would it be more advantageous from a tax standpoint if I purchased the bonds naming my son and myself as co-owners or naming him sole owner?

A. From a tax standpoint, naming your son sole owner of the bonds would be more advantageous, since interest on U.S. Savings Bonds bought in the name of the child is income to the child not the parent. This is so even if the parent paid for the bonds and is named beneficiary. However, interest on bonds purchased by a parent naming his child as co-owner is taxable to the parent. For more information, see IRS publication 576, "Tax Information on United States Sav-

ings Bonds." Contact your local Internal Revenue office for a free copy.

Q. Are brokerage fees deductible?

A. Fees you pay a broker to collect your bond interest or dividends on shares of stock are deductible as miscellaneous deductions. But brokerage fees paid to acquire investment property, such as stocks or bonds, are not deductible. They are added to the cost of the property.

Q. I work as a waitress in a restaurant. Occasionally, a group of customers will use our banquet room for a private party. Instead of tipping, customers are required to pay a service charge which is split among the waiters, waitresses and other employees. Should I

report this amount as a "tip" to my employer for tax purposes?

A. No. Your share of this service charge is not a tip, but is part of your wages paid by the employer. As such, it is taxable, but does not have to be included in your report of tips to your employer.

Q. My son is 20 and works full time during the day and goes to school at night. Can I still claim him as a dependent regardless of how much money he makes?

A. Generally, you may not claim a person as a dependent if he had gross income of \$760 or more during the year. The only exceptions to this rule occur if your child is less than 19 at the end of the year or a full time student during five months of the year. In your son's case, he is over 19 and is not considered a full time student because he is attending night school and is employed full time during the day.
