

Three Offensive MEAC Players Are Honored

Richard McGee of Howard has been named offensive lineman of the week in the Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference (MEAC) and Robert Hammond of Morgan State and Warren Craddock of Howard have been named co-offensive backs of the week in the league.

McGee, a 6-3, 240-pound senior offensive guard from Landover, Maryland, was singled out for his crisp blocking and his ability to open holes for the Howard running backs in the 51-0 win over Hampton Institute recently.

Both Hammond and Craddock had outstanding performances last week. Hammond, a 5-10, 175-pound junior from Baltimore, rushed for 199 yards in 30 carries and set a new school record in Morgan's 16-10 win over A & T. Hammond, who scored both touchdowns for the Bears, broke the school one game rusing mark set by John Sykes in 1970 against North Carolina Central with 182 yards in 29 carries.

Craddock, 5-11, 192-pound senior from Arlington, Virginia, carried the ball 19 times for 198 yards and scored three touchdowns in Howard's 51-0 win over Hampton Institute.

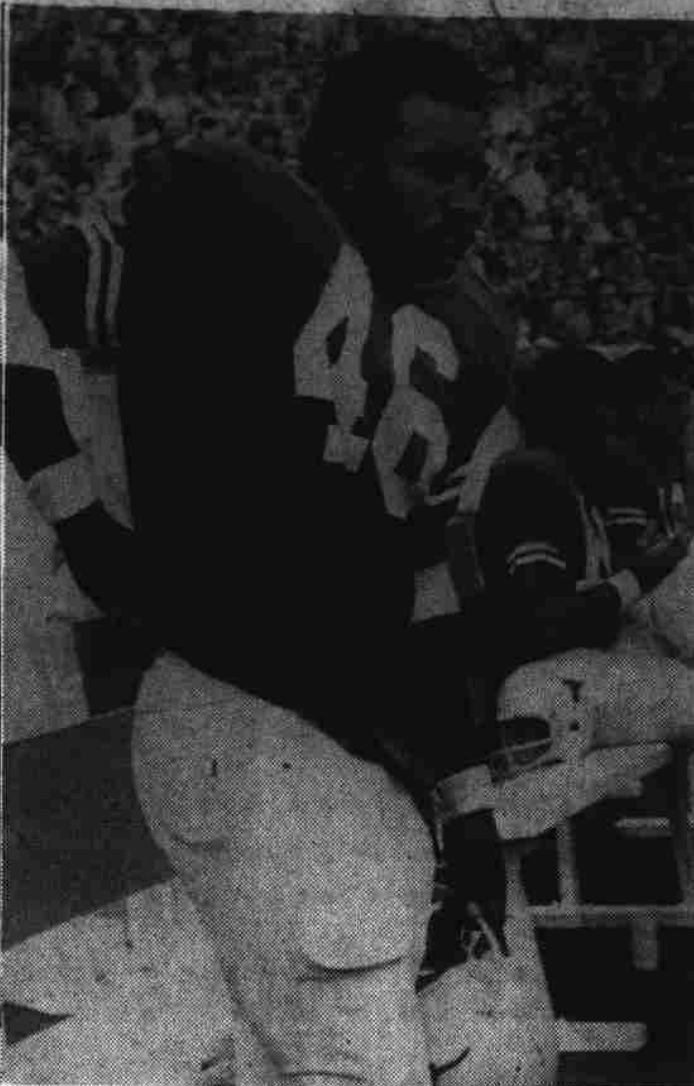

Defensive Stars Of MEAC Are Recognized

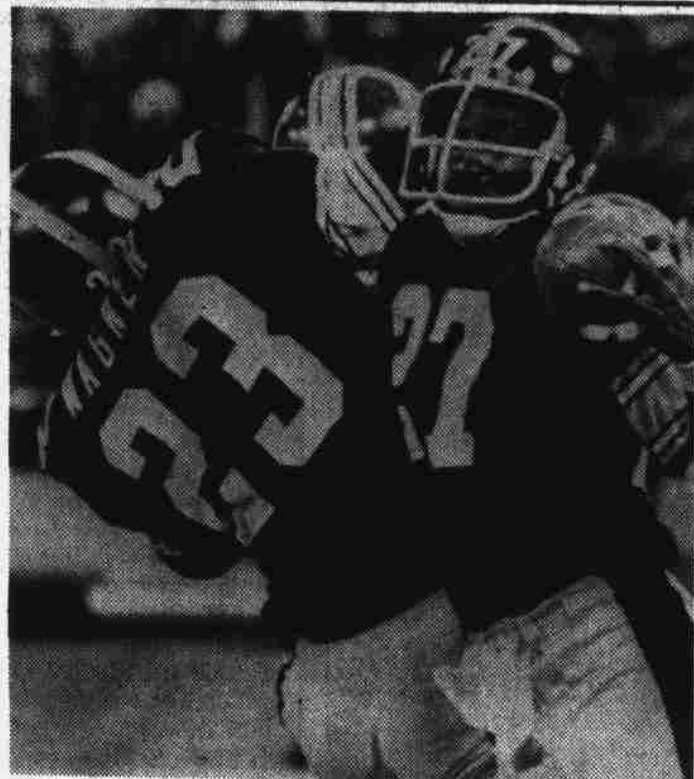
Larry James of South Carolina State has been named defensive lineman and linebackers Eugene Simms of Morgan State College and Alexander Jones of North Carolina Central are co-defensive backs in the Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference (MEAC).

James, a 6-2, 220-pound defensive tackle from Lyman, S. C., had eight unassisted tackles, four assisted tackles, sacked the quarterback twice and recovered two fumbles which led to scores in S. C. State's 30-7 victory over Maryland-Eastern Shore.

Simms, 6-0, 225-pound junior from Baltimore, Maryland, was outstanding from his linebacking position in his team's 27-7 upset over previously unbeaten Howard. Simms, who along with Jones have been honored for the second time this season as defensive player of the week in the MEAC, broke through the block a Howard punt which led to the second touchdown for

Morgan. North Carolina Central dropped a 15-7 decision to Johnson C. Smith recently in Charlotte but Jones played an outstanding game in defeat. Jones was credited with 12 tackles, four assisted tackles, blocked one punt and intercepted one pass. Jones is 6-2, 205-pound senior from Durham.

Other players nominated for the defensive player of the week award were Ronald McNeill of North Carolina Central, Norvell Fuller of Howard, Carl Hairston of Maryland-E.S., John Hampton of North Carolina A & T, and Nate Dancy and Odell Jones of Delaware State.

On Hashish

Mental Health Ass'n Produces Major Film

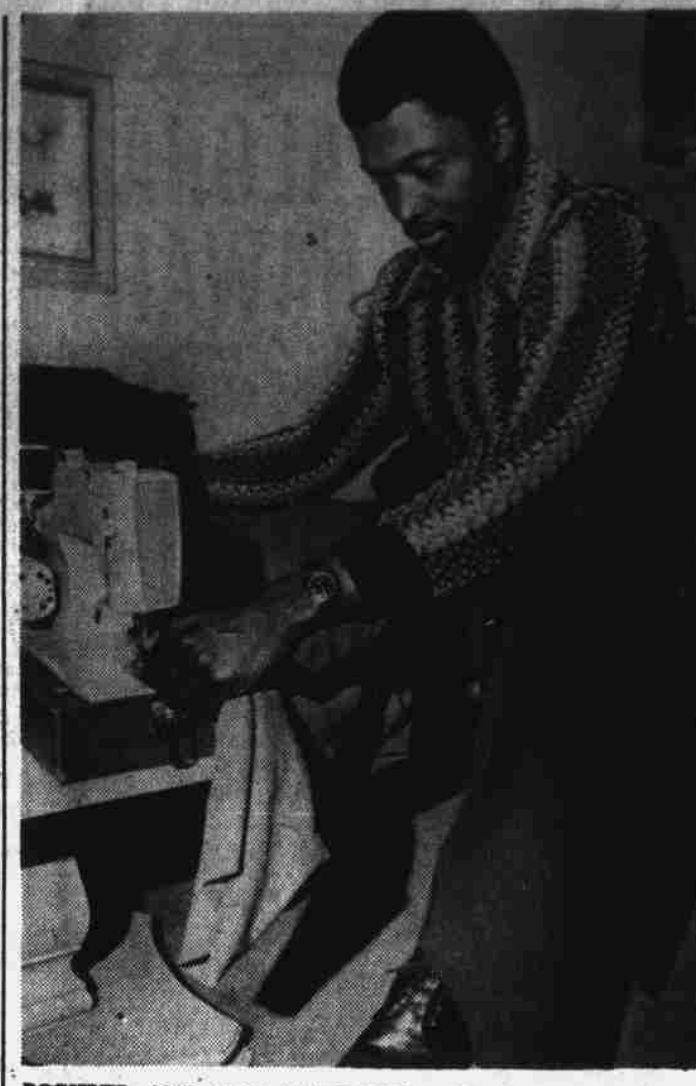
WASHINGTON - The world premiere of a new film JOURNEY, will be staged at the 1973 Annual Meeting of the National Association for Mental Health, said Mrs. J. Skelly Wright, NAMH President, recently. The meeting is scheduled for November 13-16, at Atlanta's Regency Hyatt House.

Third in a projected series of twenty films JOURNEY represents NAMH's most current effort to help dispel the stigma surrounding mental illness and the mentally ill. According to Mrs. Wright, "We can no longer permit myths, misconceptions, and prejudices to stand in the way of a person's willingness to seek help for emotional problems."

"Just as concentrated public education campaigns succeeded in eliminating the embarrassment and stigma attached to other health problems," Mrs. Wright added, "we hope to be able to remove the myths surrounding mental illness. Our new emphasis on mass appeal films is intended to help us reach as large an audience as possible, to help ensure that those needing help for emotional difficulties no longer need be afraid to seek that help."

JOURNEY, which was made possible through a grant from Pfizer Laboratories Division, Pfizer, Inc., New York, deals with several major areas of concern including: the symptoms that may indicate a person has problems serious enough to require help; how one should respond or react to someone who is mentally ill; the specific causes of mental illness; the basic fears that keep people from seeking help; and what that help is like.

JOURNEY is a 28½ minute color film, and was produced by Imagination, Inc. of San Francisco. The film is cleared for television usage. Major actors in the new film are the Berkeley Mime Troupe; and it was written and directed by Robert Anderson of San Francisco.
