Business in the Black

VOTE NO ON BELL BILL



American Telephone and Telegraph Company with its subsidiaries around the country are up to their old deceitful tricks against poor people. The phone company is attempting to put an insurmountable barrier against equal competition with its heavily lobbied Consumer Communications Reform Act (more accurately called the Bell Bill).

The phone company is out to make its monopoly of the masses untouchable. This money making machine does not deserve to dictate to the masses. The phone company made more profits last year than General Motors Corporation the world's largest automobile producer.

In fact the phone company's profits will probably go over the four billion dollar level after tax profits in 1977. The Bell bill is to build in these profits to the tune of one billion dollars - a quarter for the telephone titanic. No corporation, nobody walks away from their business with as much after-tax profit now as the phone company.

The phone company with over a million employees making it second only to the federal government in hiring, must be pushed to eradicate racism from its ranks. In November of 1970, as president of the San Francisco chapter of the NAACP this writer complained about racial discrimination in the hiring and promotion of blacks to Paul W. Loze, then division manager, the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Company, J. D. Sutorius, then division commercial manager, Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Company and W. L. Mobraaten, then vice president and trea-

surer of its parent the American Telephone and Telegraph Company.

These past six years have seen very little change in the promotion practice of the phone company to benefit blacks. Mobraaten was able to rise during his first eight years to the vice president level of a subsidiary company and to an executive officer position in the parent company in the relatively short scope of 14 years.

We applaud him, he deserves it for his hard work and dedication to the system. But many a black has put forward an equal effort and is equally deserving of rapid promotions within the ranks of the phone company. When the phone company can put forward a board of directors who are representative of this entire nation, a managerial group with equal participation by minorities and vendor's program similar to the US government's 8-A contract set aside program, then we can make positive sounds about maintaining their monopoly.

Alfred E. Kahn, chairman of the New York State Public Service Commission stated, "The Bell system has bought almost every economist - myself included - at one time." For the record, this writer has been tempted, but not bought. Nor will I be intimidated by the telephone company's lackeys who line my managing editor's office in San Francisco in response to my previous column. The Bell bill is bad for blacks.

The Congressional Black Caucus should call for an update report on the Department of Justice Civil action under

SENIOR CITIZEN'S CORNER

Federal Deposit Insurance
If your bank posts signs that it is insured by Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC). What does this mean to you - the depositor? Basically, it means that your account is insured up to \$40,000. Thus, if your bank goes bankrupt, FDIC will arrange for your deposits to be replaced.

FDIC also offers other depositor safeguards. As an independent agency that regulates state chartered banks, FDIC has three options if any of these banks declares bankruptcy.

1. It can close the bank and pay off its customers' accounts up to the insured amount. Under this option, you will be reimbursed immediately up to \$40,000 for lost deposits.

2. FDIC could arrange for another bank to assume the failing bank's operations and accounts. Since a bank closing may be caused by factors unrelated to general market conditions (such as management or scandal), healthy banks in the area may view the situation as perfect for their expansion. FDIC will then choose from a number of bidders.

3. If the closing of a bank leaves consumers without a bank in a needed location, FDIC can set up a Deposit Insurance National Bank.
