RALEIGH - On January 1977, Andy Griffith, wellknown television and movie star, will come home to North Carolina to act as Master of Ceremonies for the Inaugural Ball. To be held in honor of Governor-Elect and Mrs. James B. Hunt, Jr. and the incoming Council of State, the Ball will be given at the Williams Neal Reynolds Coliseum in Raleigh.

Governor-Elect Hunt, whose campaign stand in support of increased development of creativity in North Carolina brought nationwide attention to a state already noted for its many "firsts" in the arts, asked the North Carolina Symphony to act as co-sponsor of this event. Proceeds will be divided between the Junior League, whose long-standing involvement with the Ball is well recognized, and the Symphony.

fith winds up the evening with his own homesoun humor, the Symphony will swing into a waltz led by Hunt and members of the incoming Council. This will be followed by dancing to the music of Bob Haas and his 18-piece orchestra.

Crude Oil Price Rise Would Be Felt by All

The threat of another price rise in imported crude oil has Americans again thinking more seriously about energy-how it's used

and how it can be conserved. North Carolina State University extension specialists explain that industry is the largest user of energy in the

U.S., accounting for a little more than 40 per cent of the total consumption. When the cost of this energy goes up, it's felt all the way down the line to the consumer. Transportation is the second largest energy user. About a quarter of all the energy used in this country

goes to move people and things. Some of it is used very inefficiently. Airplanes, for example, are the least efficient users

of energy in transportation, but they rank just barely ahead of automobiles in this dubious distinction. The most efficient transportation from the standpoint of fuel economy is transportation public buses and trains.

About one-fifth of the U.S. consumption of energy is used in homes. Here, heating and cooling are the major users.
