MINORITY HEALTH INTERNS

CHAPEL HILL - The American College of Hospital Administrators (ACHA), based in Chicago, Ill., has announced the establishment of a summer intern program for minority students titled the "Albert W. Dent Work-Study Fellowship." The program is designed to address the issue of minority involvement in the health administration field.

Dent is president emeritus of Dillard University in New Orleans, La., and was the first black administrator in ACHA.

Announcement of the fellowship in North Carolina was made this week by the N. C. Health Manpower Development Program (NCHMDP) in Chapel Hill. NCHMDP, an inter-institutional program of the University of North Carolina system that was organized in response to the acute need for more minority and disadvantaged health professionals in North Carolina, will serve as the contact agency in the state for students interested in the fellowship.

The Dent Fellowship, which carries a stipend of \$3,000 was launched as a result of a 1973 ACHA task force on minorities. Findings of the task force showed a great need to correct the underrepresentation of minorities in health administration positions.

Candidates for the fellowship must:

- Complete a summer internship as a participant in the National Work Study Program administered by the Association of University Programs in Health Administration and the National Association of Health Service Executives.
- Be a student in good standing in an acceptable undergraduate or graduate program in health or hospital administration. Students in undergraduate programs must show proof of acceptance in the fall term in a graduate school in hospital or health service administration.
- Produce two letters of endorsement from persons who will attest to the potential and sincerity of the candidate to pursue his or her career goals.
- Be able to relocate in Chicago for the 11 week internship from June 13 to Aug. 26. Married candidates must assume responsibility for their families during intership period.

Deadline for submitting applications is March 15. Students interested in the fellowship should contact NC HMDP in room 201 of the HMDP Plaza, 136 E. Rosemary St., 322-A, Chapel Hill, or phone 966-2264/65.

Apple-Mince Cobbler Swirls: A New Mince-meat Treat

If you only think of mince-meat once a year for that traditional mince pie, you're overlooking a versatile convenience food that adds taste appeal to a variety of recipes. Serve these Apple-Mince Cobbler Swirls warm from the oven for a dessert to delightfully convince your family and yourself that mince-meat is a savory flavor to enjoy anytime, any season.

Unlike a cobbler where the biscuit batter is dropped on top of bubbly fruit, these attractive swirls are filled jelly-roll-style with mince-meat and apples. Although the dessert looks fancy, it's simple and quick to fix.

Mix together flour, baking powder, and salt. Using pastry blender or two forks, cut in butter until mixture resembles cornmeal. Add milk; mix lightly to form a soft dough. On lightly-floured surface, roll dough into a 9x15-inch rectangle. Spread with mince-meat and chopped apple. Roll up like a jellyroll. Cut into 15 one-inch sections. Arrange rolls, cut-side up, into a 9x13-inch pan. Bake at 400°F. for 10 minutes; prepare syrup during this time: Combine water, molasses, sugar, butter, and lemon juice in saucepan. Heat until almost boiling. Carefully pour hot syrup over rolls. Reduce oven heat to 350°F. and continue to bake for 30 minutes more.

Let rolls stand 15-20 minutes to allow syrup on bottom of pan to thicken slightly. Serve warm with plain cream, ice cream or whipped cream. 15 servings.

Apple-Mince Cobbler Swirls:

- 2 cups flour
- 1 Tablespoon baking powder
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/3 cup butter or margarine
- 3/4 cup milk
- 2 cups prepared mince-meat
- 1-1/2 cups chopped apple
- 2/3 cup water
- 1/4 cup unsulphured molasses
