DELTA 34th CONVENTION SLATED FOR DENVER

WASHINGTON - "An Agenda for Change" will be the theme of the 34th National Convention of Delta Sigma Theta, Inc., a national public service sorority, to be held at the Convention Center in Denver, Colorado, August 6-12.

Mrs. Thelma Daley, national president of the 95,000 member organization, announced that over 4,000 delegates and their families are expected to attend the five day session.

She pointed out that the program has been planned to focus attention "on major problems faced by our nation, and particularly largely by woman and minority citizens."

"We expect the delegates to address these problems in a forth-right manner in an effort to redefine the issues, generate new data, establish new directions and develop a comprehensive, practical and workable agenda for change."

An organization of mostly black, college educated and professional women with about 600 chapters throughout the United States, Haiti and Liberia, members of Delta Sigma Theta can be found in leadership positions on the local, state and national levels.

Among the program highlights will be two special luncheons with nationally known speakers as well as a series of workshops to provide participants with continuing education credits.

Hostessing the convention is the Denver Alumnae Chapter under the leadership of Linda Bates Transou, chapter president. Convention coordinators are Josie R. Johnson and Cleotia Jernigan.
