



Eagles To Host Panthers Saturday

The NCCU hagles host the Virginia Union Panthers on Saturday. September 3rd at O'Kelly Stadium. Kickoff is set at 1:30 p.m.

The Eagles, 6-5 last year, are searching for their fifth straight winning season under the tutelage of Willie S. Smith.

The Panthers were 7-4 under Willard Bailey. The Panthers lead in the

series 11-9-0 but lost the last encounter with the Eagles in 1970 14-0. Coach Smith's and Coach

Bailey's teams met in 1971 when they played to a 0-0 tie. Smith was then the head coach at Maryland - Eastern Shore

The Eagles under Coach Smith have never lost their opener. In 1973 they whipped Winston-Salem 21-13: the

following year they played Savannah State to a scoreless tie; in 1975, they beat Savannah State 30-0, and last year they plummeted Elizabeth City State 34-0.

Coach Smith is looking for an improved offensive and defensive output from his charges.


in total offense and 189.3 yards rushing last year", re-marked Coach Smith. "With a healthy team all year, we should be a very competitive unit."


Spearheading the Panthers will be senior cornerback Frank Dark who picked off 8 enemy passes last year.


