**Black History Human Relations Week Observed at Brogden**

A daily slate of activities marked the observance of Black History-Human Relations Week at Brogden Junior High School, February 12-16.

On Monday, Dr. E.E. Thorpe of the History Department at North Carolina Central University spoke on "Black History In America". Mrs. Lillie Kelly sang spirituals. She was accompanied by Mrs. Sarah Barden.

On Tuesday, a film, "Black and White: Uptight", presented causes of social and economic differences and offered some possible answers to resolving the differences.

Coach Carter and the North Carolina Central Gymnastic Team were featured on Wednesday.

Freddie Parker of the History Department at NCCU spoke on "Black Leaders Up to Martin Luther King". Some Brogden students presented a brief dramatization, "The Life of Martin Luther". At a special assembly program, Mrs. Barbara Cooke and Mrs. Gwendolyn Haskins of the NCCU Music Department, presented gospel and spiritual music. A special jazz group also performed.

On Friday afternoon, February 16, students at Brogden Junior High School had the opportunity to talk with many area business people and professionals. The Afro-American Career Fair was a high point for the week long activities celebrating Afro-American History Month. Seventh and eighth grade students at the school interviewed the participants in the school gym which was decorated with red,

black and green streamers, balloons and banners. The participants answered questions dealing with their training, the part they enjoyed about their work, what was difficult about their work, and what recommendations they had for junior high students. off funds where essential to gain compliance.

It asks the Department of Justice to move more quickly to complete cases under its jurisdiction.

Finally, it recommends to President Carter that he designate a single high official "to coordinate all of the resources and authorities of the executive branch to bring about a vigorous and effective enforcement of the constitutional mandate to desegregate elementary and secondary schools."

In its letter to the President and Congress, the Commission concludes: "School desegregation not only continues to be a constitutional requirement, but a vital national goal that we believe is broadly supported by the American people."

Its report points out that in the 46 profiled districts,

desegregation is working in those instances where community leadership followed through in its commitment to find "constructive solutions to difficult educational problems."

The Commission on Civil Rights is an independent, bipartisan, fact-finding agency concerned with discrimination or denial of equal protection of the laws because of race, color, religion, sex, age, handicap, or national origin.

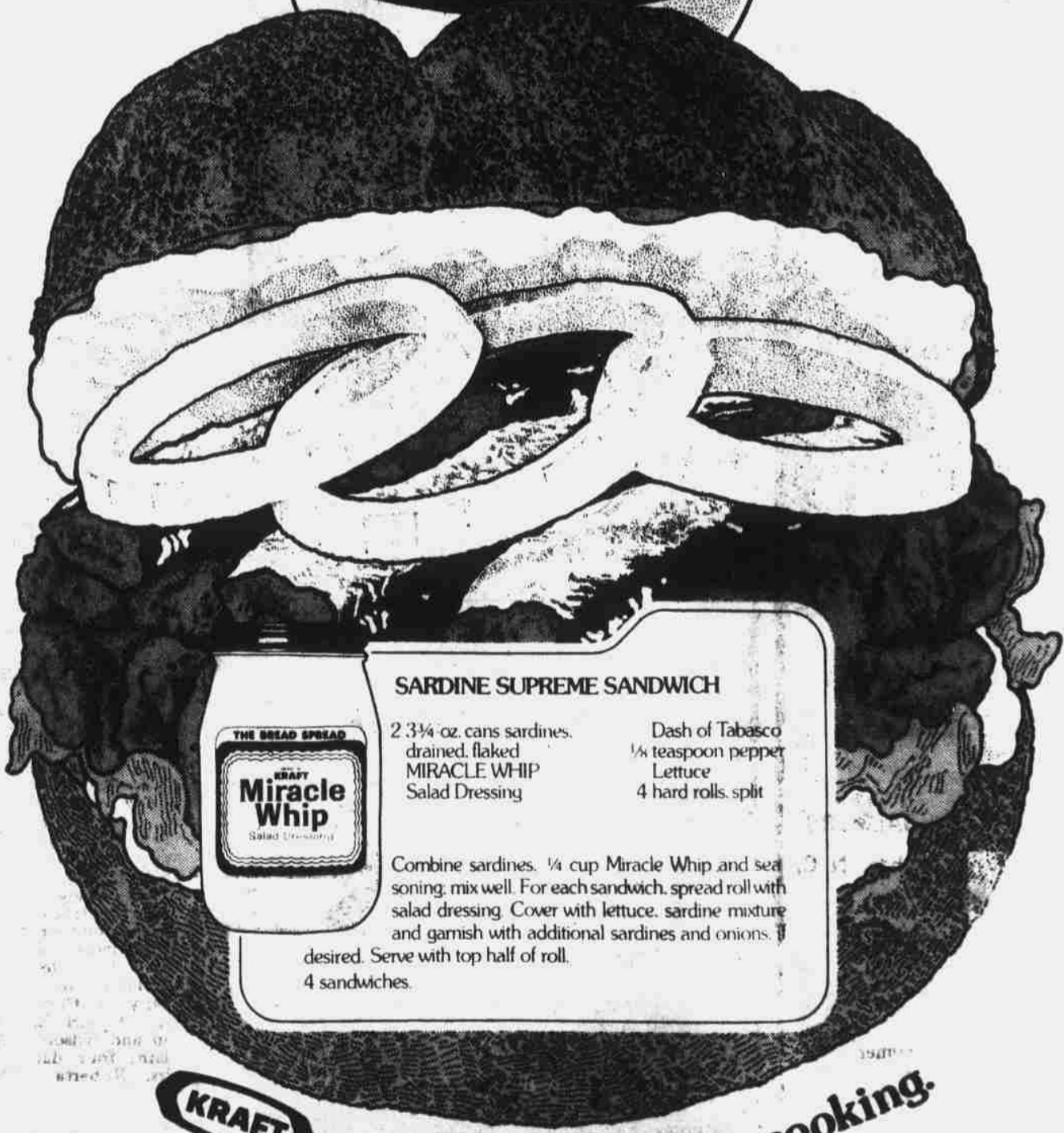
