

New Public Affairs Program to Premiere on WTVD-TV

"REFLECTIONS," a new locally produced program which will be heavily involved in the interests of the minority community, will make its debut this Saturday, March 31 at 6:30 P.M., on WTVD-TV TOGETHER, immediately following Eye-witness News.

Producer-Host Lea Adams, who recently joined the staff of WTVD after serving an associate producer at WDM-TV in Washington, D.C., will interview Ms. Michele Wallace, Author of the controversial new best-seller, *Black Macho and The Myth of the Superwoman*. Lea and Ms. Wallace will discuss items from the book such as the thought that men are afraid of women, and therefore they oppress them; along with her opinions on black men and women, marriage and sexual roles, and Ms. Wallace's life as a writer.

"Reflections" will be a weekly presentation of WTVD, and will be seen on Saturdays at 6:30 p.m. The program will feature topics and guests of national note, such as an upcoming interview with national news anchorman Max Robinson, as well as those of local and regional interest. "Reflections" is produced by the Public Affairs Department of WTVD-TV TOGETHER.

Ervinwood Youth Group Learns About Rights Of Adolescents In N.C.

Youth of the Ervinwood Community heard J. Carlton Polk, Community School Coordinator with the Durham County School System discuss the "Rights of Adolescents in the State of North Carolina, County of Durham and in the Home Environment," recently.

Polk informed the youth that they did possess certain rights under the law and explained how the laws relate to adolescents and how they are in conflict with some existing state laws. He stressed that these laws were passed to ensure the protection of the youth of this state.

The Ervinwood Youth Group is an organization of adolescents between the ages of twelve and seventeen who reside in or adjacent to the Ervinwood subdivision. It serves as a forum for the development of positive self-images through expression, leadership development, cultural enrichment, awareness and social etiquette.

On April 4, Dr. Y.G. Bryant will discuss "Opportunities for Minorities in the Field of Chemistry."

On April 11, Ms. Joyce Grant of the Health Education Division of the Department of Social Services will begin a series of discussions on adolescents and sex.

Ebony Group & Co. To Present "God's Trombones"

The Ebony Group and Company from Charlotte will present "God's Trombones: Seven Negro Sermons in Verse" by Jems Weldon Johnson as the featured entertainment at the culmination of the 1979 Jabberwock, Delta Sigma Theta's annual scholarship/charity fund raising event. The program will be on April 7 at 8 p.m. in the Hillside High School auditorium in Durham.

The Ebony Group and Company, Charlotte's first independent Black theatrical company, was formed in November, 1975. This group was formed to provide a forum for the Black actor and meaningful, relevant theater for the Black community. Since its first production of Lonnie Elder's "Ceremonies in Dark Old Men," the group has produced, staged, and directed and performed in fourteen different plays. Since 1976, the company has performed "God's Trombones" over 30 times in churches, schools, community centers, and community festivals.

The latest success the company encountered was an adaptation of "Trombones" entitled "A Tribute to the Black Preacher" performed before a 2,500 capacity audience in Charlotte's Ovens Auditorium. The accolades of the audience, the press, and the Charlotte community for the production surely underscores the fact that the Ebony Group has fulfilled its stated mission and is a vital cultural asset to the Black community.

FARM WORKER WEEK PROCLAIMED

Mayor Wade L. Cavin signed a proclamation Wednesday recognizing Farm Workers Week in Durham. This is the second year that the Week, sponsored by the National Farm Worker Ministry, has officially been recognized in Durham. The week has been designated "in recognition of farm worker families' contributions, struggles and hope."

During April 30 - May 6, churches, synagogues, and congregations in North Carolina will be participating in celebrations and services which focus on farmworkers and farmworker struggles. As 1979 is the International Year of the Child, emphasis will be given this year to the hardship of the migrant and farmworker child.

Ms. Alice Goodfellow Davis of Durham is Chairperson of Farm Worker Week. Ms. Davis is coordinating volunteers who will contact North Carolina congregations inviting them to sponsor special activities. Last year, 21 congregations in Durham, Chapel Hill and Raleigh participated in the week's events, including Watts Street Baptist Church which held a Family Night celebrating the beginning of their Migrant Ministry Program. Means Committees are also negotiating these items to ensure an equitable U.S. position and to make necessary changes in implementing legislation as a result of the agreement's approval.

One overwhelming obstacle to Congressional approval is what language can be used to ensure that private industries of foreign nations purchase our domestic goods. Our international counterparts are not likely to change their procurement practices of purchasing from the lowest bidder - a philosophy to which the U.S. subscribes but cannot economically afford to maintain.

The Administration has

taken a middle-of-the-road approach by requesting a threshold which it hopes will appease the minority and small business community, as well as others whose programs promote domestic purchasing. That threshold, \$180,000 - 200,000 per Federal agency "included", is so arbitrarily low that almost no "included" agency's small and minority business set-aside program could be exempt. Said Ms. Hill, "It is apparent that the Administration has no intention of upholding its support of the small and minority business community when it nullifies small and minority business promotional programs even before implementing regulations are finalized." This Administration appears to be foreign policy oriented,

with not even the glimmer of domestic policy in sight.
