Miller Nat'l Bowling Tourney To Offer Amateurs \$125,000

TAMPA, Fla. — Amateur bowlers will compete for \$125,000 in cash prizes during the Miller High Life National Doubles Tournament scheduled to begin August 15 and conclude with the national finals in Reno, Nev., December 14-16, the Miller Brewing Company announced here today.

During a presentation before the Bowling Writer's Association of America (BWAA), Thomas J. Kleiber, Manager-Special Events for Miller, outlined the plans for what is expected to be one of the richest amateur events of its type in bowling history.

Kleiber explained that the eventual national champions will receive a check for \$50,000. The runners-up will be awarded \$25,000; third place, \$15,000; fourth place, \$10,000; fifth place, \$5,000; sixth place, \$2,000; and seventh place, \$1,000. All other finalists will receive a check for \$500.

"The total prize money available alone makes our tournament unique from most others," Kleiber stated. "But there are other aspects that will also make it very attractive to bowlers around the country."

Outlining the format for the program, Kleiber said that there will be three levels of competition leading to the crowning of the national champions.

In-house competition will be held at bowling centers throughout the country from August 15 to November 1 to decide the entrants for the state

finals. The state winners, to be decided no later than December 1 will then move to the national finals in Reno.

Kleiber said the format of the tournament requires in-house tournaments to be conducted separate from league play. Proprietors of the individual bowling centers will establish special squads during open play where the doubles teams will be able to compete for the first time.

"As mentioned, this is a doubles event. This doubles team can be two

men, two women or mixed doubles," Kleiber said.

"The Miller National Doubles Tournament will also be a handicap tournament to provide as much equality as possible to all teams that enter. All male members of a team will be handicapped at 80 per cent of the difference between their American Bowling Congress (ABC) league average and 210. All women members of a team will be handicapped at 90 per cent of the difference between their sanctioned Women's International Bowling Congress (WIBC) average and

210," Kleiber continued. "No two bowlers can enter if their combined sanctioned average exceeds 380," he said.

"If a bowler does not have a 1978-1979 ABC or WIBC average, he or she could use a 1979-1980 league average, provided that a total of 18 games have been bowled before entering the tournament. If neither an average from last year or one from the year before is available, the bowler must enter the tournament with a 200 scratch average."

Albany State Finalizes '79 Grid Season Schedule

ALBANY, Ga.— The Albany (Ga.) State College "Golden Rams" football team will play a rigorous schedule of eleven opponents in 1979, including seven away games, it was reported here recently.

The season, which will begin on September 8, will feature the regular five Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (SIAC) opponents, along with five usual non-conference rivals and one new foe. Two NCAA Division I-AA schools are on the slate which also includes six Division II and three Division III schools.

The Rams will conduct a very stern road rampage in September and October as six of the scheduled eight games are away. The first stop will be Fayetteville, N.C. on September 8 when ASC meets Fayetteville State, before traveling to Tallahassee, Fla. on the 15th to face the perennial Division I-AA '78 National Champion Florida A&M. The Albany hometown fans will get their first glimpse of the team on the 22nd when Alabama A&M invades High Mills Memorial Stadium. The team then takes to the road again to close out the month on the 29th at Tuskegee.

As in September, only one home game is on the slate for October, that begins a contest with Alabama State on the 20th. Albany will face Bethune-Cookman in Orlando, Fla. on October 6; New Division I-AA foe Alcorn in Lorman, Miss. on the 13th and Morris Brown in Atlanta, Ga. on the 27th.

Homecoming activities

will conclude on November 3, when the Rams host Clark. Savannah State will be the next opponent on November 10, when ASC travels to Savannah, Ga. before concluding the regular season against arch-rival Fort Valley State on November 17 at home.

Looking at his tough mission, ASC head coach Whitney Van Cleve said he expects conference rivals Florida A&M, Alabama A&M and Bethune-Cookman to be three of his toughest opponents in '79. He added, "We've got to improve on every area in order to be a competitor in our league. Our strongest points are our quality running backs and defensive backs. Our weakest point is our lack of depth to be a top contender."

Hornets Win 400-Meter At Penn Relays

The Delaware State College Men's relay team of Harold Peart, Anthony Beamon, NAIA All-American Robert Bryant, and Jim Seal, won the 400 meter relay College Division Championship with a 41.04 clocking at the Penn Relays on April 28, 1979. The Hornets sprint medley team consisting of teammates Robert Bryant, Anthony Beamon, Jim Weal, and Cliff Moore finished third with a time of 3:25.01 in the College Division. Moore, a freshman, made a strong showing in this event, running the anchor leg in 1:53.0.

In the 800-meter relay Championship of America, DelState's Anthony Beamon, Duane Henry, Robert Bryant, and Jim Weal took fourth place with a time of 1:25.5, surpassing the school record of 1:25.8 set earlier this season. The Univ. of Maryland took first place, while Louisiana St. and E. Carolina finished 2nd and 3rd respectively.

Weal placed sixth in the 100-meter dash with a 10.63 clocking.

The Hornets were without the services of sprinter Mike McKnight and Aaron Harvey who suffered pulled muscles at the Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference Championship, where DelState took second place behind conference champs South Carolina State.
