

A&T Gains Accreditation For School of Business And Economics

GREENSBOR — Officials of A&T State University have been notified that the university's School of Business and Economics has been accredited by the American Assembly of Collegiate Schools of Business.

The approval of A&T's undergraduate business program was made during the assembly's annual meeting in New Orleans. The AACSB is the sole accrediting agency for programs in business throughout the nation.

"We are extremely pleased with this latest achievement of our school of business and economics," said Dr. Lewis C. Dowdy, Chancellor of A&T. "This accreditation completes the gaining of national approval for all of our academic programs for

which this is possible. This was the goal which the administration and the faculty adopted back in 1967."

In gaining this honor, A&T becomes the fifth business school in the state with a program accredited by the AACSB, and only the third historically black university in the nation with accreditation. Only twenty per cent of the more than 1,000 business programs in the nation are accredited.

Other AACSB accredited business schools in the state are at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, Duke University, East Carolina University, and Appalachian State University.

Call For VETS To Change Discharge Status

The Veterans Administration wants to alert veterans who received undesirable discharges more than fifteen years ago that they may now be able to have their discharges upgraded if they apply by the end of the year. The new Department of Defense review will waive the non-application time limit through 1979, according to A Regional Director Keith E. McDonald.

and major veterans organizations are operating in the process of providing information to assist veterans in making large review applications, McDonald said.

Normally, veterans have fifteen years after they leave military service to seek reviews that determine the propriety and equity of the discharge. The Defense Department action allows veterans with undesirable discharges issued before 1965 to review if they apply before January 1, 1980.

Each case is judged on its own merits in consideration of all relevant information available for the review. Discharge upgrading to "general" or "honorable" may entitle the veteran to certain Federal benefits that previously were denied.
