

Call For Action Reports 168 Calls For Ask The Lawyer Day

The Durham and Raleigh Call For Action offices experienced a successful "Ask the Expert Lawyer Day" last month with 168 calls. The attorneys manning the telephones in Durham were from private law firms and members of Durham Young Lawyers Association. There were three staff attorneys from the North Central Legal Assistance Program. Of the six attorneys, three were women.

The majority of persons seeking legal information were women between the ages 20-38 years. All income brackets were represented, but most of the callers were from the middle income bracket. Most of them had never paid for legal services, however. The categories of information needed by the callers were business/finance, consumer, family law (including divorce, child custody and support), probating wills, real estate, government benefits, unemployment compensations and criminal law.

This year's effort was determined to have yielded the best results realized in Durham. Eighty-one persons were able to talk with the lawyers and the telephone company clocked 612 calls that were unable to reach the busy lines. 264 persons called after lines had closed at 7 p.m.

In evaluating the project, the attorneys said the service was a worthwhile one for the Durham community. They believed that most of the callers were in need of legal advice, but many did not know where to get legal assistance. Since the lawyers were representing the North Carolina Bar, they were unable to give their names or their firms, but were able to give the callers the Lawyer Referral Service or Legal Aid, Small Claims Court or the Attorney General's office.

The Durham Call For Action Offices wishes to thank publicly the president of the Durham Young Lawyers Association and the director of the North Central Legal Assistance Program for obtaining the lawyers to man the phones.

The Call For Action Volunteers who assisted were Mrs. Sarah H. Jones, Mrs. Virgie J. Davis, Mrs. Frances Schooler, Mrs. Catherine Stanbaek and Linwood Blount.

Call For Action is planning another National Project, "Ask the Tax Expert," at some later date.

I think there is a song with lyrics that tell us that "no man is an island, no man stands alone." That can be a parable for some of the famous Black culture landmarks that are located throughout this nation. My comments will be about a specific historical monument—the Black college or university.

Way back in 1865 when a college education was hard to come by for ex-slaves, the churches recognized the need for learning reading, writing, and ciphering, and with the help of The Freedmen's Bureau, they founded Howard University, Fisk University, Atlanta University, Tougaloo College, St. Augustine's College, and Morgan State to name a few institutions of higher learning. Cheney opened its doors in 1839, and Lincoln University in Pennsylvania was educating in 1854.

There's no denying that when Black folks needed them, the Black colleges welcomed them with open arms and gave us many of our great doctors, lawyers, educators, and scientists. But as the saying goes...how soon we forget. Today many of these colleges need the support of those Black Americans who loudly boast that "I'm Black, and I'm Proud." As the dinosaur of yesteryear, many of our Black institutions of higher learning are facing extinction. How can that be when Black Americans earn more than \$70 billion annually? The answer is quite simple—we are too busy doing our own thing. Young Blacks have accepted the fallacious belief that you can't learn anything at a Black college, while the middle and upper income class Black families choose to adopt the attitude of "I got mine, shame on them if they don't have their's."

It is now time to prove that Black is beautiful. Each graduate from a Black college or university should mail at least five dollars (\$5.00) to their alma mater each year. You know, the school you save may be your own.

Butts, now executive minister of Abyssinian.

Escaping Heat Goes Right Out Window

Half the heat that escapes your home goes right out the window.
