| 1 cup pitted California ripe olives | 1/4 teaspoon pepper |
| 1 flank steak, about 2 pounds | 1/2 cup water |
| 2 cups sliced onions | 2 beef bouillon cubes crumbled |
| 1/4 cup cooking oil | 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg |
| 1-1/2 teaspoons salt | 1 tablespoon cornstarch |
| | 1 pint dairy sour cream |

Cut olives in slices or wedges. Cut meat diagonally in 1/8-inch thick strips. Brown meat and onions quickly in 1 oil. Add salt, pepper, 1/2 cup water, bouillon cubes and nutmeg. Cover and simmer 10 minutes. Add cornstarch mix with an additional 2 tablespoons water. Continue cooking stirring constantly, until thickened. Stir in ripe olives. Blend in sour cream. Heat through but do not allow to boil. Makes 8 servings.
