Versatile Ground Pork Helps Cut Food Cost

If you have reached a dead end in your search for new ideas for economical family meals, change directions and consider all the delicious and creative things you can do with ground pork.

There are many routes you can take with this budgetstretcher. Simply shape ground pork into patties and serve burger-style, or feature it in meat loaves, meatballs and casseroles. For an economy entree with special appeal, try ground pork, as a savory stuffing for green pepper shells, suggests the National Live Stock and Meat Board.

Savory Stuffed Peppers

11/2 pounds ground pork

teaspoon salt teaspoon pepper can (1034 ounces) cream.

of celery soup

can (7 ounces) whole kernel corn, drained medium onion, finely chopped

large green peppers tomato slices

Parmesan cheese Lightly brown ground pork in large frying-pan; pour off drippings. Sprinkle salt and pepper over meat. Add celery soup, corn and onion and cook slowly 10 to 12 minutes, stirring occasionally. Cut green peppers in half length-wise and remove membrane and seeds, cook in boiling salted water for 2 minutes; invert and drain thoroughly. Fill pepper halves with meat mixture and place on rack in roasting pan. Bake in a moderate oven (350°F.) for 15 minutes. Sprinkle salt on both sides of tomato slices and place on top of stuffed pep-pers. Sprinkle with Parmesan cheese and bake 15 minutes onger. 6 servings.
