portunity; the Administration's proposed sub-minimum wage which is claiming to make possible more minority youth employment but which would, in reality, lower the average wage level by replacing minimum wage paying jobs; the proposed tuition tax credit which would end up being a government subsidy for middle-income whites to educate their children in segregated private academics; extension of the Voting Rights Act which expires in August 1982.

The NAACP lobbying efforts will also be aimed at the new Administration's proposed cut-backs in social services and job training programs. According to Mrs. Coleman, "Cutbacks in the CETA Program, Food Stamps, Social Security, school lunches and Unemployment Compensation all deeply affect the black community, where some of these programs literally offer the difference between going hungry or not for many black families. The NAACP will be taking on the right wing anti-busing efforts that are aimed at reversing the trend toward integrated quality public education.

The Legislative Mobilization Conference began on Monday, March 9, with a youth session at which activist Dick Gregory was the keynote speaker. Conference participants were addressed by Dr. Benjamin Hooks, executive director of the NAACP and Senator Howard Baker, (R-Tenn) Senate Majority Leader. Workshops centered on the effects of the proposed legislation as well as techniques on how to lobby effectively. Participants visited their Congressmen on Wednesday before the Conference's final wrap-up session.

All NAACP Branches are called upon to continue to educate their members and the black community as a whole in the importance of registering and voting. Mrs. Coleman said, "This Legislative Mobilization Conference won't be successful if it is a one-shot effort. It will require our continued efforts to visit legislators in the home districts and follow up on what we are starting."

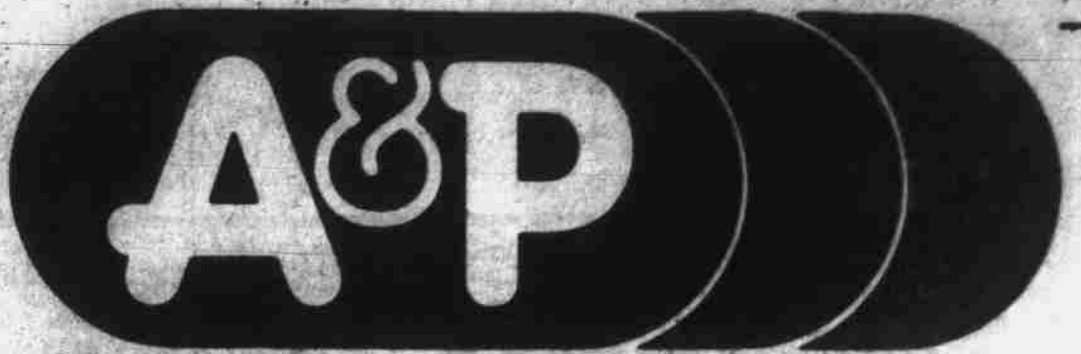
The Board also adopted the calendar for the 1981-82 school year which listed August 24 as the beginning of the school year and June 4 as the closing date.
