WABC-TV's newscaster John Johnson filed a suit alleging racial discrimination against the station last year and a settlement said the station would feature him in a regular series along with other assignments. Johnson was host of "Air Mail Special" the show suddenly yanked off the air last week because some of the letters it said were from fans actually came from staff. Station said that Johnson was not party to the deception and station's confession that all was not on the up-and-up might stave off an FCC investigation.
