## Delta Seminar For Teens Held In Chapel Hill

Sixty junior and senior high school students from schools in Chapel Hill, Hillsborough and Durham attended the third Delta Seminar for Teens held recently at Hargraves Recreation Center in Chapel Hill.

Students heard Chapel Hill Attorney Emma Jean Levi define and illustrate common legal terms that relate to teenagers who abuse the law. She also informed them of their personal rights as citizens and their rights to have legal counsel. Ms. Levi concluded her presentation by telling the students that having respect for one's own personal property will give one an appreciation for other people's belongings. Ms. Levi handles many juvenile cases in her law practice.

A talk on survival skills and coping with stressful situations, given by Dr. Darnell Hawkins, associate professor of sociology at UNC, opened the afternoon session. Dr. Hawkins' talk led into students forming groups to investigate ways of conflict management and self-awareness as well as further elaboration on topics presented earlier.

The groups were facilitated by Dr. Denise Barnes, clinical psychologist at UNC; Michael Young and Ms. Irma Best, Ph.D. candidates in clinical psychology at UNC; Ms. Carolyn Moore, Ph.D. candidate in clinical psychology from St. Louis University; and Clifton Cotton, graduate student in counseling psychology at UNC.

ACC Rookie of the Year from UNC, Sam Perkins, ended the seminar by highlighting some of the problems he encounters in organized sports and the problem solving techniques he uses to resolve them.

The seminar was sponsored by the Chapel Hill-Carrboro Area Alumnae Chapter of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc., a public service organization.
