Spaulding Sponsors Resolution For Slain Atlanta Children

State Representative Kenneth B. Spaulding introduced a joint resolution Friday, April 17, in the General Assembly to "express the deep concern over recent murders" of the 25 black children in Atlanta, Georgia.

The resolution states that these murders have caused "citizens throughout the United States to become extremely concerned for the well-being of the children of Atlanta. Although the state and local police and law enforcement agencies, concerned citizens and volunteers have made a concerted effort to apprehend the criminal or criminals, solving the crime does not yet seem imminent."

Section 1 of the resolution calls upon members of the General Assembly to express their concern over the murders.

Section 2 of the resolution requests the General Assembly to call upon Gov. Hunt to offer and provide any assistance at his disposal to the officials in charge of the investigation of the murders.

Section 3 of the resolution requests the General Assembly to petition "other states to make similar offers of assistance" in the form of the best manpower, equipment, and skills that can be made available to "stop these senseless murders."

Section 4 calls for the Secretary of State to deliver a copy of the resolution to Gov. Hunt and the legislative body of

every state in the United States.

The bodies of four additional black men, three of whom were reputed to be mentally retarded and who looked to be the same age of the other murdered children, were recently discovered in Atlanta.

A report released in the last two weeks from the Task Force investigating the murders announced that there was evidence to indicate that several of these murders may have been committed by several persons and that only six of them may have been committed by the same person. The Task Force also announced that it had collected evidence leading

to a prime suspect for the crimes, but at the date of this writing, no one has been arrested.

Rep. Spaulding is among several persons in the area who have expressed concern for the slain Atlanta children. His resolution included the signatures of 15 other persons.

In related activities, one of the mothers of a slain child appeared at Duke University last week.

On Sunday, April 18, Ms. Estelle Roberstin, a student at NCCU, scheduled a memorial service for the slain children at Zion Temple on Sparella Street in Durham.

Region K Women Making Strides as Winners

Having been selected as the most outstanding Title IIB Project in Region K, the staff and students of the Career Development Center for Displaced Homemakers took part in a two-day photography session which depicted the classroom training and counseling activities of the career development program.

The Center, under the direction of Ms. Jane Ball-Groom and Ms. Janice M. Moore, was chosen as one of the nine regional winners for its success in meeting the needs of a targeted group and its effective methods of integrating program objectives on a community based level. Sequences from the photo session will be part of a slide presentation to be shown to Title IIB Operators throughout the State of North Carolina.

In operation since 1979, the Center, under the technical guidance of the North Carolina Council on the Status of Women, has served over 140 women who have met the definition of a displaced homemaker — a woman attempting entry or re-entry into today's job market after having suffered traumas associated with divorce, separation, widowhood, disability of spouse and/or termination of public benefit assistance.

Ms. Groom and Ms. Moore, residents of Warren and Granville counties, said they are hoping to experience continued success in the 81-82 program year with the opening of a new corporation, Choices, Inc., of Region K. New additions will be made to the existing program format with expansion of the present service base to meet the needs of a non-restrictive income sector and to provide technical assistance to other community service agencies via networking and interagency referrals.

Women who have graduated from the Center's Core Program can now be found in varied areas of education, training and employment. Approximately ten have entered local GED Preparatory Programs. Some have enrolled at the local community college and are receiving training in such courses as Nurses Assistant, Electronic Assembly, Accounting and Office Technology. Over thirty of the Center's former students are now working in areas such as health, manufacturing, social services, computer science, law, fast foods, and merchandising.

The Center, located at 139 College Street, stresses self-analysis and career motivation services to women residing in the counties of Franklin, Vance, Warren and Granville. applications are now being accepted for the program's Spring and Summer quarters.

Durham Alumnae Deltas To Hold Blood Pressure Screening

The Durham Alumnae Chapter of Delta Sigma Theta sorority, Inc., (a public service organization) will sponsor a High Blood Pressure Screening Campaign during the month of May, which is High Blood Pressure Month.

The Delta's will be in South Square Mall on the lower level Friday and Saturday May 1 & 2, in an effort to educate the public in the detection, treatment, and control of hypertension-The Quiet Killer.

The screening booth will operate from Noon until 9 p.m. Friday May 1st and 10 a.m. until 9 p.m. Saturday May 2nd.

The public is invited to come by the booth and have their blood pressure taken and receive tips on how to control high blood pressure.

Ms. Armstrong Named To Health Council By Gov.

Governor recently named Ms. Elaine P. Armstrong to the N. C. Health Coordinating Council.

Ms. Armstrong is the branch head of the Group Care Facilities Section in the N. C. division of Facility Services. She is a member of the Capital Health Systems Agency Board and the National Association of Black Social Workers.

Ms. Armstrong will represent Health systems Agency IV on the council and will serve a three year term.

The council is a federally authorized health board that helps determine health care priorities in North Carolina. It consists of 41 members — 40 appointed by the governor, plus an ex officio, non-voting member appointed by the Chief Medical Director of the Veterans Administration. Twenty-four of the Governor's appointees represent the local health system agencies.

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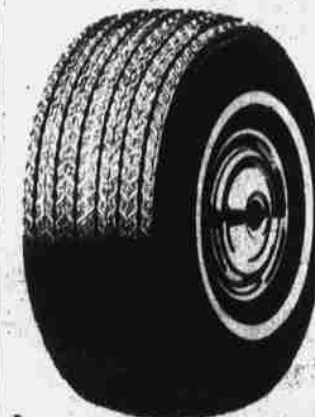
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
