Local Deltas Attend National Convention

More than thirty Durham Deltas attended the 36th National Convention of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc., at the Sheraton in Washington, D.C., August 1-5. The general theme for the conference was "Delta Family Reunion - Coming Home." The sorority was founded at Howard University in 1913 by 22 young black women. This marked the 68th anniversary of the organization.

One of the many highlights of the convention took place on Sunday when more than 10,000 Deltas, dressed in white, marched down Pennsylvania Avenue to the U.S. Capitol to offer prayers for the nation in a moving ecumenical service. The principal speaker was the Rev. Dr. Pauli Murray, an honorary Delta and the first black woman to be ordained an Episcopal priest. She expressed her deep concern about recent budget cuts and tax policies.

On Sunday night, Deltas saluted the black performing arts at the Washington Hilton Hotel. The Alvin Ailey American Dance Theater, the Arthur Mitchell Dance Theater of Harlem, the Fisk Jubilee Singers, the Negro Ensemble Company, Inc., and Ruby Dee and Ossie Davis were the recipients of the Osceola Award, named for one of the founders.

Soror Patricia Roberts Harris, who held cabinet positions in the Carter administration, became the eleventh recipient of the Mary Church Terrell Award at a luncheon on Tuesday. In her address, she urged Deltas to organize as well as increase the gains of blacks.

Washington, D.C. Mayor Marion Barry presented keys to the city to Delta founders Winona Cargyle Alexander and Bertha Pitts Campbell and national president, Mona H. Bailey.

Such dignitaries as Walter Faunroy, Dorothy Height, Rev. Jesse Jackson, Rev. Joseph Lowery and Mayor Richard Hatcher were among the panel participants at one of the sessions. They explored the topic: Advocacy and Networking for Black America. A special conference was planned for teens on Tuesday. The theme for their conference was "Educating Black Youth for Survival and Advancement in the 80's - Phase II." The keynote address was delivered by Dr. Arthur Thomas, vice president of Academic Affairs at Central State University, Wilberforce, Ohio, among the topics discussed in work group areas were: Teenage Sexuality, Facing Teenage Crisis, Self-Awareness and Identify, Black Culture and History, Clarifying Your Values, Survival Skills, and Career Awareness Preparation.

A closing banquet on Wednesday night concluded the convention. As a highlight of this session, meaningful remarks were made by twelve of Delta's past national presidents.

This convention had more Deltas in attendance than any other in the organization's history.

The 37th national convention will be held in Detroit, Michigan in 1983.
