Millions In Federal **Funds Being Lost To North Carolina**

North Carolina will assume responsibility for administering most of the nine block grants that are authorized by Congress as of October 1 of this year.

The cuts will mean reductions in services ranging from health services and child day care to energy assistance and transportation. The state budget office has decided to pass the cuts along across the board. 5

Varying federal and state requirements and stipulations are attached to the block grants to prevent political pressure and favoritism as the states decide how to divide the funds among agencies. For instance, the largest block grant tobe turned over to the state is social services which covers such areas as mental health, child day care, and foster care. Broad discrimination provisions are attached to en-

sure fair distribution. Recently representatives from several public agencies, at the Statewide Coalition on Block Grants meeting, examined the question of fair distribution. Although the state budget office said cuts will be felt across the board, some agencies believed that their programs may not be high on the state's priority list. Some agencies believed that provisions against discrimination will have little effect if the transition to block grant funding is not closely monitored.

ZOMEPIRAC

Zomepirac (zoe-me-PEER-ak) is used to relieve pain. It is available only with your doctor's prescription.

A commonly used brand name is Zomax.

Proper Use of This Medicine

· Take this medicine only as directed by your doctor. Do not take more of it, do not take it more often, and do not take it for a longer period of time than your doctor ordered. Taking too much of it or using it for a longer period of time may increase the chance of side effects.

• If this medicine upsets your stomach, it may be taken with antacids. However, sodium bicarbonate (baking soda) may make the medicine less effective and should not be used. If you have any questions about which antacid to use, ask your doctor or pharmacist. If stomach upset (nausea, vomiting, stomach pain, or diarrhea) continues, check with your doctor.

• If you are taking this medicine on a regular schedule and you miss a dose, take it as soon as possible. Then go back to your regular dosing schedule. However, if it is almost time for your next dose, do not take the missed dose at all and do not double the next one. Instead, go back to your regular dosing schedule. If you have any questions about this, check with your doctor.

Precautions While Using This Medicine

. If you will be using this medicine for long periods of time (for example, for several months at a time), your doctor should check your progress at regular visits, in order to make sure that the medicine does not cause unwanted effects.

• This medicine may cause some people to become dizzy, drowsy, or less alert than they are normally. Make sure you know how you react to this medicine before you drive, use machines, or do other jobs that require you to be alert.

· Stomach problems may be more likely to occur while you are taking this medicine: -if you drink alcoholic beverages. Also, alcohol may increase the chance of dizziness or drowsiness occurring while you use this

-if you take aspirin or other nonsteroidal anti-inflammatory/analgesic medicines (for example, some kinds of arthritis medicine). Therefore, do not use any of the above without first checking with your doctor.

Side Effects of This Medicine

· Along with its needed effects, a medicine may cause some unwanted effects. Although not all of these side effects appear very often, when they do occur they may require medical attention. Check with your doctor if any of the following side effects occur: More common

tarry stools Wheezing Hives · Check with your doctor also if blurred vision or other vision problems occur while you are taking this medicine. Although zomepirac has not been shown to cause vision problems, similar medicines have caused them and the possibility that they may occur with this med-

icine also always exists. Other side effects may occur which usually do not require medical attention. These side effects may go away during treatment as your body adjusts to the medicine. However, check with your doctor if any of the following side effects continue or are bothersome: More common

Bloated feeling or

Headache Indigestion Nausca or vomiting Stomach pain

Trouble in sleeping

Diarrhea Dizziness Drowsiness Less common Changes in taste

Unusual nervousness or restlessness
