

However, man must remember that there can be few successful achievements exclusive of careful planning. If man really considers his present status, he would be wise to set some attainable goals for making his future more secure. Of course, one needs not anticipate a course of endeavors exclusive of some difficulties. Anticipations of many hidden snares alert the traveler regarding endurance along life's journey.
