Center Channel 4. The half-hour gourmet spectacular condenses a dining adventure which actually lasted nearly nine hours. At-

tired in black tie and evening gowns, the lucky guests at the annual University of Wisconsin-Stout Haute Cuisine Dinner come from all over the United States for this once in a lifetime event.

Stout students spend three years of undergraduate study preparing for the chance to be on the Haute Cuisine staff — the chance to assist with a dinner that takes 20,000 man-hours to complete because of its extravagance as well as its complex and precise execution. At a cost of more than

\$540 a couple, the food is all prepared by seniors majoring in hotel and restaurant management. Tantalizing and overwhelming, the many courses range from crown rack of veal with sauteed apples to a flounder stuffed with crab, lobster and shrimp to a pineapple ice cream dessert served with flaming fruit. Hosted by Max Herbach, C'EST SI BON features special guest Christian Inden, who has twice won the Escofier Medal for high achievement in the culinary arts.

## Health-Wise

### ATTACKING ANOTHER KILLER

After the worldwide victory over smallpox, health officials are now pursuing the elimination of other infectious diseases. In the United States, measles is considered the most threatening of childhood contagious diseases. A vigorous campaign began in 1978 to rid the nation of measles by October 1, 1982. If it is successful, the program could be a model for other countries desiring to eliminate similar infectious diseases.

In the United States during the 1950s, before measles vaccine was available, an average of one-half million cases were reported each year—and it is estimated only one in ten cases were reported. Complications resulting from measles included pneumonia, encephalitis resulting in permanent brain damage and mental retardation, ear infections leading to deafness, and a rare and fatal degenerative disease. An average of 500 died each year. In 1962, the year before vaccine was widely used, nearly five million cases of measles were reported. After 1963, reported measles cases dropped by more than 90 percent.

Three factors make domestic measles elimination a possibility: (1) humans are the only susceptible host; (2) an effective vaccine is available; and (3) the number of people in the carrier stage—without



detectable symptoms yet able to spread the virus—is reduced.

The United States program consists of four major efforts:

1. More emphasis on finding and immunizing susceptible adolescents and young adults, most of whom were born before vaccine was in general use.
2. More efforts to insure that school immunization requirements cover children in all grades, and that these requirements are enforced.
3. Broadening the scope of the present surveillance system in order to find cases that would previously have gone unreported.
4. Improving the ability to control epidemic outbreaks.

The campaign to remove a serious health threat is worth duplicating in every country of the world. However, measles is only one of many infectious diseases for which an effective vaccine is available. Persistent effort can bring the desired results—that of eliminating disease.
