3-A; Camp Lejeune is ahead in 2-A and a close race is developing in Class 1-A between Robbinsville, Edneyville, the Eastern North Carolina School for the Deaf and John Wilkinson.

The Wachovia Cup award, sponsored by Wachovia Bank and Trust Company and the North Carolina High School Athletic Association, recognizes four high schools every year which have the best overall athletic programs. The Wachovia Cup program is in its third year.

South Mecklenburg leads in 4-A, with 170 points, while Chapel Hill is second with 158 points. South Mecklenburg won the state 4-A championship in football and girls tennis, and finished third in soccer. Chapel Hill finished first in boys and girls cross

country, tied for fifth in volleyball and tied for eighth in soccer. Both schools received 30 points for having a team in all six of the sanctioned sports for the fall season.

In the 3-A Wachovia Cup race, T.C. Roberson High in Skyland has 167.5 points, while Watauga, in second place, has 147.5. T.C. Roberson came in first in 3-A volleyball competition, finished second in boys cross country, and tied for second in soccer.

Watauga finished first in 3-A boys cross country competition, finished second in girls cross country, and tied for fourth in volleyball. T.C. Roberson received 30 points for participating in all six of the sanctioned sports, and Watauga received 25 points for participating in five sports.

Camp Lejeune is

leading the 2-A race with 110 points, followed by Ledford and Randleman, which are tied with 70 points each. Camp Lejeune came in first in 2-A soccer competition and third in volleyball. Ledford High in Thomasville finished first in volleyball, while Randleman was state champion in 2-A football competition. Camp Lejeune received 30 points for having a team in all six sports, and Ledford and Randleman received 20 points each for participating in four sports.

In a close 1-A race, Robbinsville has 60 points, while Edneyville and the Eastern North Carolina School for the Deaf in Wilson are tied at second place with 57.5 points each. John Wilkinson High in Belhaven is fourth with 55 points. Robbinsville won the 1-A state championship in football. The School for the Deaf and Edneyville tied for first in volleyball, and John Wilkinson was runnerup in football. All four teams received 10 points for participating in two of the six sanctioned sports.

All schools which finish in the top eight positions (plus any ties) in a state championship event receive Wachovia Cup points. In events such as track where 4-A, 3-A, 2-A and 1-A schools all compete together, Wachovia Cup points are awarded based on the school's standing

against other schools in its own classification. If there are fewer than eight schools from a classification in the event, only those schools which are represented are eligible to receive Wachovia Cup points. Points are awarded for all sports in the following manner: fifty points for first place, 45 for second, 40 for third, 35 for fourth, 30 for fifth, 25

for sixth, 20 for seventh and 15 for eighth. In the event of a tie, the schools will receive an equal number of points based on the number of teams which tie and the number of teams which finish higher in the standings. Five points are awarded for each sanctioned sport in which a school competes.

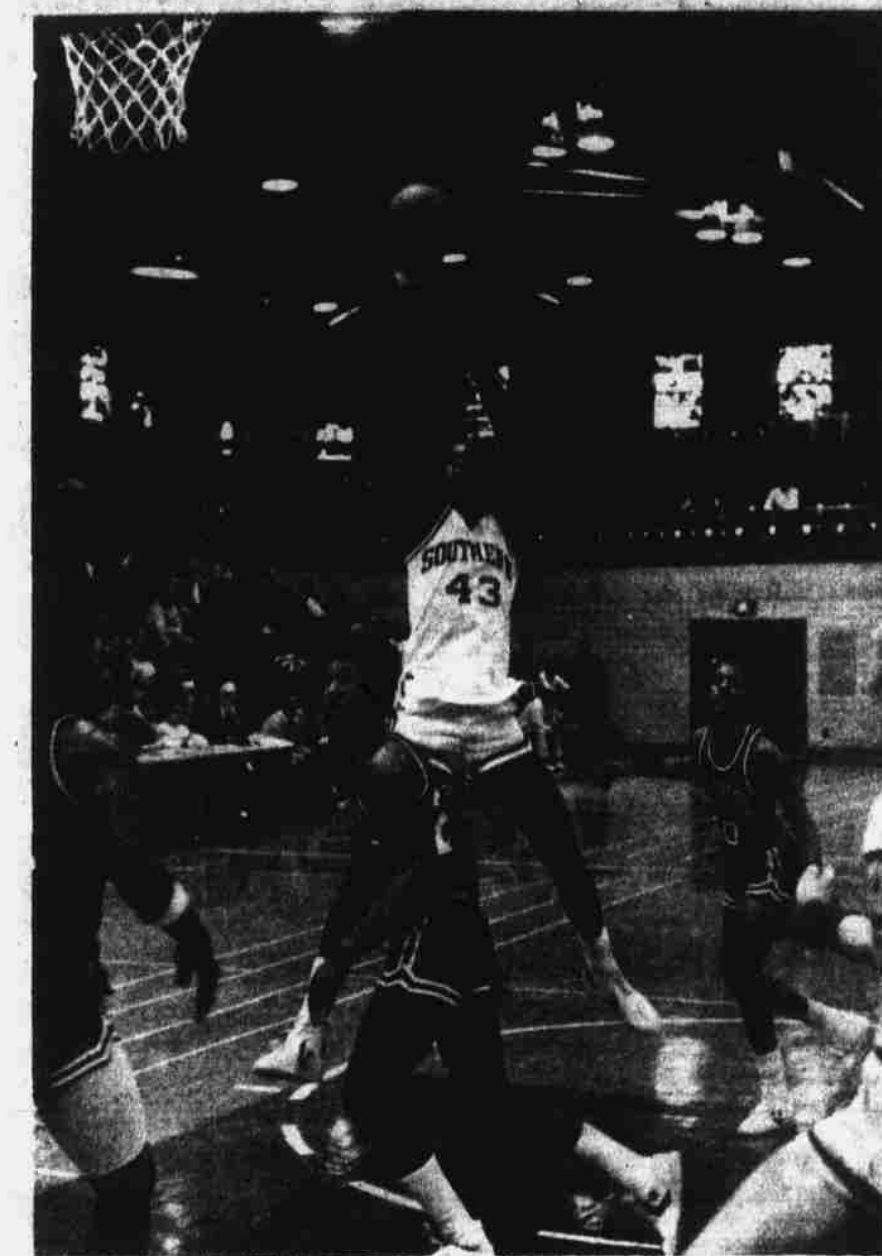
Following completion

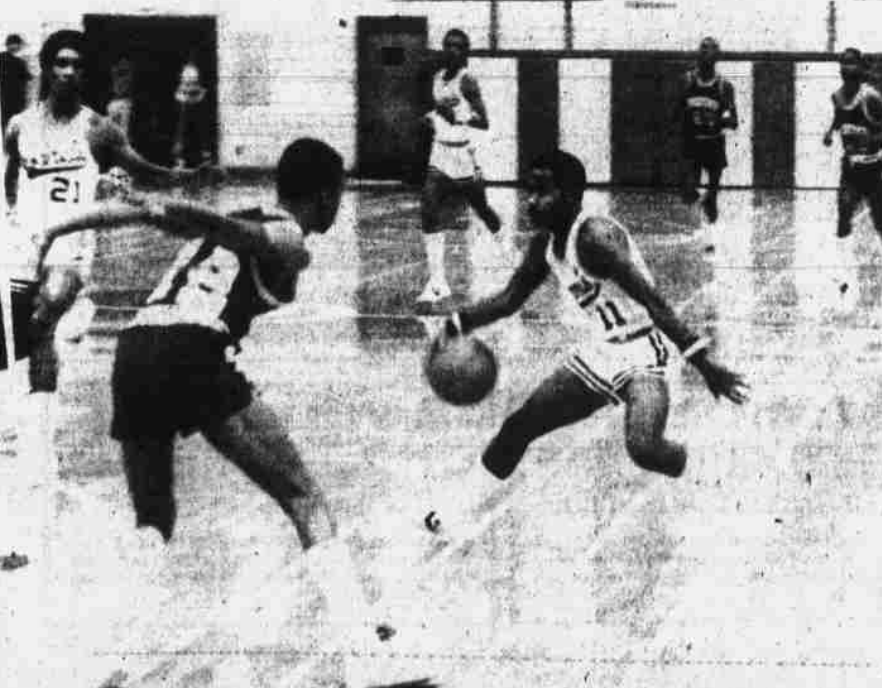
