Hooray for Hollywood Presents "Julia

"Julia", the Academy Award-winning film based on Lillian Hellman's short story, starring Jane Fonda and Vanessa Redgrave in the title role, premieres on public television as part of "Hooray For Hollywood, Saturday, January 30, at 9 p.m. on Center Channel 4.

"Julia" was adapted from a story in Pentimento, Hellman's 1974 volume of memoirs, which recounts her lifelong friendship with Julia and the terrifying demands of that friendship against the backdrop of growing Nazism

in Europe. Produced by Richard Roth, the film also stars Jason Robards as Dashiell Hammett, the acclaimed author of detective novels who lived with Hellman for several years;

.. Academy Award for Best Screenplay Adaptation. The film opens in 1934, as Hellman struggles to write her first play, and finds her

memory returning again and again to her childhood friend, Julia. Born into great wealth, Julia had grown increasingly bitter toward her family, and had gone to Vienna to study Freud, where she became involved in the anti-Nazi movement. .

In the years between 1934 and 1937, Lillian meets her friend in Europe twice. The first time, she finds Julia in a Vienna hospital, swathed in bandages and unable to talk. When Lillian returns to the hospital the next day, she finds Julia has undergone a

mysterious operation and has left a note telling Lillian to leave Vienna as soon as possible.

Lillian does not hear from Julia again until 1937, when she is approached by a friend of Julia in Paris, who asks Lillian to help their work in the underground by smuggling money to Berlin. Lillian agrees, and embarks on a terrifying train journey which ends in an unexpected meeting with Julia, who has lost a leg.
Julia has also had a baby,

whom she named. Lillian after her friend, and who lives away from danger across the border. Julia asks Lillian to keep the baby in New York until she returns there to have her leg seen to.

Lillian never sees Julia again. She is killed by the Nazis. Nor does she ever find Julia's child.

"I enjoyed portraying Lillian Hellman in the film," said Jane Fonda. "Like all interesting characters. Lillian is a woman full of contradictions. . . . a woman who recognizes courage, real courage, but isn't always capable of it herself."

Stateline To Cover Presidential **Nomination Debate**

Shortening the presidential nominating process, and lessening the influence of minorities and other special interest groups are two proposals facing the Democrats' Commission on Presidential Nominations when they meet in Washington this month. "Stateline" will be there to cover the debate and analyze the results, on Friday, January 22, at 7:30 p.m. on Center Channel 4.

The Commission, chaired by North Carolina Governor James B. Hunt, is made up of leading Democrats from around the nation. Its final report is expected to have a major impact on the way choose Democrats presidential candidate.

Sure to be a fiery issue is a proposal to bring all primary elections into a thirteen-week timespan, or "window." New Hampshire, where the first primary is traditionally held, has already protested the window proposal. The state's primary customarily draws exaggerated attention from the media because it is held months before other primaries, and a thirteen-week "window" could make it just one of several held in the first week. Presidential hopefuls Fritz Mondale and Edward Kennedy back opposite sides, and a major political battle is shaping up.

With its 1976 rule that women make up half the convention's delegates and that minorities get more seats, the party virtually eliminated seats held by elected officials. That has caused a huge rift in the party, and sparks are expected to fly when the Commission debates the makeup of future conventions.
