When you don't let us know and we have to wait for the Post Office to notify us, you miss your copies and we have to pay 25¢ for every copy the Post Office returns to us.

Quite often the Post Office will not notify us immediately that you have even filed an address change with them. Sometimes it is four months before they will notify us and then they will send a big stack of returned papers for the same person - costing us 25¢ each. This drives up operating costs. We need your old address AND your new address. We need the name that appears on your label. If you want that changed too, give us the old name AND the new name. Don't forget Zip Codes.
