companies — Pine Street Taxi, Courtesy Cab and Broadway-Yellow Cab — will provide the taxibus service at a cost of one dollar between bus stops. Senior citizen fare will be 50¢.

The consortium had projected a \$1.25 fare, but competition by Dixon Cab forced that price down. Willie Dixon, the owner, had also presented a proposal for council approval, but the city manager recommended the council approve the consortium's proposal. The recommendation came Monday after both interests made changes in their original proposals.

Dixon, who first made changes, said the consortium collaborated to borrow his ideas.

In May and June of 1981, Duke Power submitted a proposal to the city to end night bus service. No action was taken until December 21 (when the city approved the request).

## Furniture Buyers Look For Quality

Consumers tend to shop carefully for major furniture purchases and they want quality and durability.

This information comes from a recent study of furniture buying cited by Wilma S. Hammett, extension interior design specialist at North Carolina State University.

"The survey found that consumers get information and plan ahead before making a major purchase," she says.

Approximately 70 percent of those surveyed were willing to pay more for known brand than a lower-priced piece of unknown quality.

Most sought information and consumer articles on furniture before buying.

They preferred matched suites in dining room or bedroom furniture, individual pieces in living and family rooms.

"Another interesting fact was the room where consumers spent the most money for furniture," says Mrs. Hammett. More than 72 percent spent the most money on living room.

The survey found that after marriage, the first furniture purchased was for the master bedroom, followed by the living room.

### NOT OLDER, BUT BETTER

It may come as no surprise to you, but Americans are getting older! And so are North Carolinians.

Actually, a greater proportion of the population is now in the middle years, according to Dr. Frances J. Wagner, extension human development specialist at North Carolina State University.

"The long-range trend for population in the USA and in North Carolina is for an older population," Dr. Wagner notes.

More than 27 percent of the North Carolina population is now between the age of 40 and 65, more than one and one-half million, she notes.

This middle-aged group is expected to continue to get larger as people born during the "baby boom" near age 40.

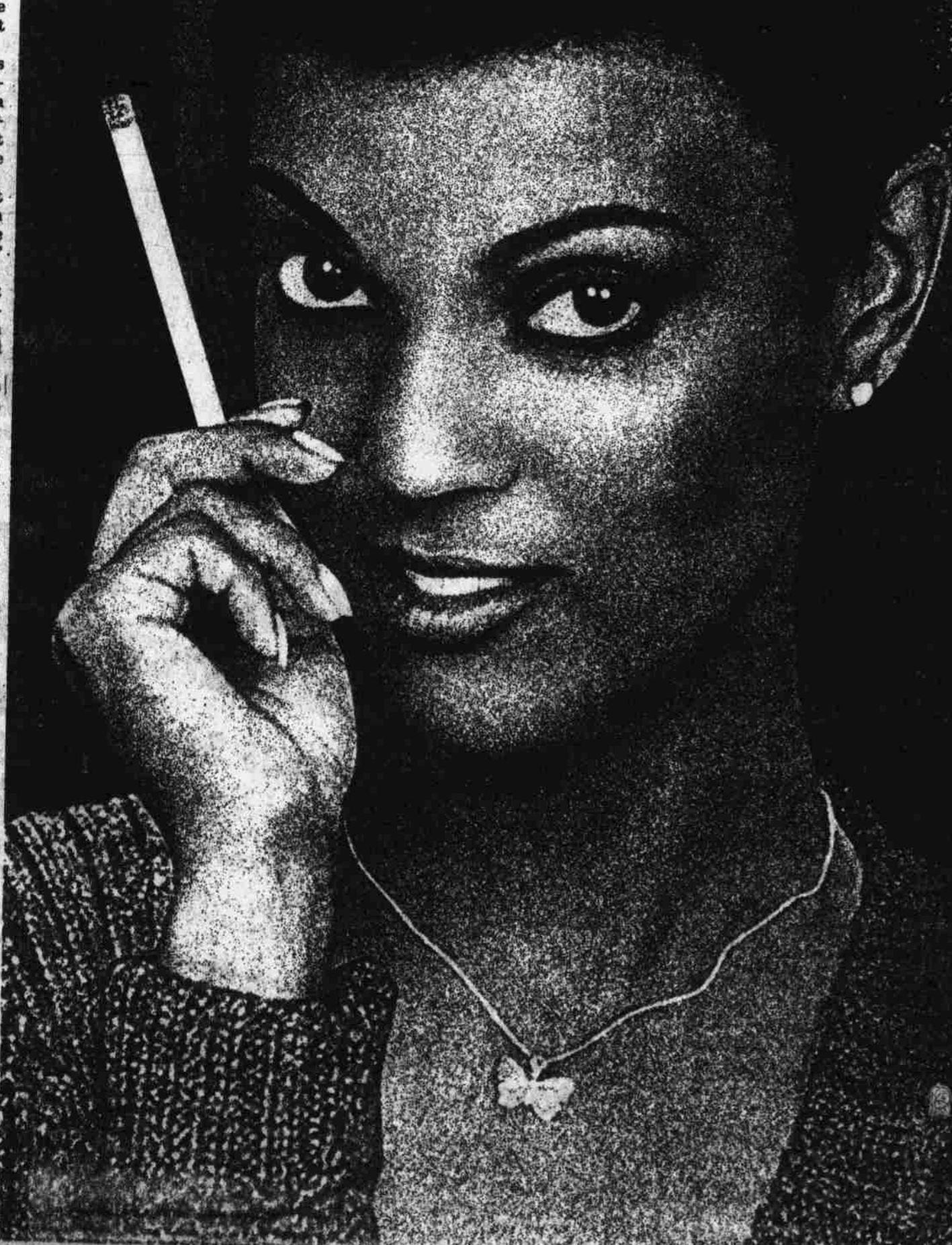
