(Continued From Front) clients who appear on the register. Only 28 returned their reports after that date.

Ms. Millard said that the procedure was tested in California and that it takes about four months to work. Prior to monthly reporting a client had to fill out a report every six months.

Of major concern is when changes occur on the form that would cause a change in a client's AFDC check. "For example, if a client works for a month, then is laid off, a lag month occurs in order for the changes to go through the system. There may be a period of a month where a client will receive no money," Ms. Millard stated.

Ms. Millard said that she did not know of any policy that would make the money that should have been received retroactive to the next month's check. "The reporting procedure is very technical also. Should a client not check a box, although the question was answered, the form will be considered incomplete and sent back. This costs postage

and a longer delay in the clients receiving their money," Ms. Millard stressed.

Durham Department of Social Services hopes to hold workshops similar to those used in preparing tax forms so that no one will be penalized.

(Continued From Front) down a \$9.75 million schools renovation request.

During the general election of 1968, voters approved a \$20 million request for a county library. However, on the same ballot was a \$10 million request for airport improvement which was narrowly defeated.

Durham citizens voted along with state voters to approve a \$300 million highway improvement bond issue in November, 1977, the last bond referendum held in Durham County.

Coupling proponents' difficulties is a \$50 million bond referendum for the airport 9,000 foot runway. The issue, to be held February 23, will be voted upon by Durham and Wake voters. Airport officials expect the turnout to be light.

Downtown Development Corporation officials have yet to state the exact cost of the civic center that would have to be financed by a bond issue. They say cost estimate will be ready by March 8, the day a

## Higginbotham To Deliver King Lecture

CHAPEL HILL — Judge A. Leon Higginbotham of the U.S. Court of Appeals in Philadelphia, will deliver the fifth annual Martin Luther King Jr. Memorial Lecture at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill on Friday, February 12.

Higginbotham, a distinguished judge, educator, author and

frequent lecturer, will speak at 8 p.m. in Memorial Hall. The lecture is free and open to the public.

A graduate of the Yale Law School, Higginbotham teaches law at the University of Pennsylvania and sociology at the University's Wharton School of Finance and Commerce. In 1978, he published *In the Mat-*

*ter of Color: Race and the American Legal Process. The Colonial Period*, the first volume of a projected trilogy.

Higginbotham served as a U.S. district judge from 1964 to 1977 before his appointment to the U.S. Court of Appeals. He also has served on the Federal Trade Commission.

The Martin Luther

King Jr. Memorial Lecture was established in September 1977 to "commemorate the lives and work of those who have dedicated their energies to fostering the concepts of human rights and dignity" and to "provide a forum for serious examination and discussion of those concepts."
