The federal government's portion of the agency's funding — received indirectly from the state — of \$557,633 is about \$158,000 less than in fiscal '81, which resulted in the elimination of some services and the laying off of about twenty staff and administrative personnel.

Operation Breakthrough and the state's 34 other community action agencies are gripped by a tighter rein now than in their previous seventeen year history, according to John Edwards, director of the Division of Economic Opportunity. DEO is a part of the state

Department of Natural Resources and Community Development that is administering the block grants. And, he said, how community action agencies will do business in the future is not altogether clear because this year's federal guidelines are subject to change.

For example, this year's allocations to the country's 900 CAAs were based on the percentage received of the total amount that Congress allocated last year. That could change next year. Also, ninety per cent of the block grant allocation was earmarked for existing CAAs. Next year another designation could make for more competition, he said.

McNeill agreed saying "the closer government gets to you, the harder things will get," referring to the transition of administration to the states.

Accordingly, McNeill said, the emphasis of the seventeen-year old poverty-fighting agency must in some respects change.

One area where the emphasis has changed is personnel. When the agency first started under the old federal Office of Economic Opportunity, McNeill said, the emphasis was one hiring "grass roots neighborhood folks."

Now, under the new block grant guidelines, the agency must write a job description for each program objective, and

that position must be filled by someone who possesses those skills by experience and/or education. This is part of the state's effort to more closely monitor the performance of CAAs.

"The affirmative action administrator has no real power," Del Castillo said, "because under the city's charter, the city manager is in charge of personnel."

He said the affirmative action administrator monitors progress and makes recommendations to the city manager.

Affirmative Action Administrator Ms. Cora McFadden, referring to the city manager preparing the report, said, "it's a good managerial practice that I feel comfortable with."

She said, however, "In terms of access to information, this office is in a better position to write the report."

Currently, the affirmative action administrator, who monitors progress on a day-to-day basis, gathers the information necessary to prepare the report, prepares a draft and is given to the city manager who prepares a

final copy. But Del Castillo said this year's draft, given to him in early February, "doesn't exist anymore; it's been worked over several times."

Ms. McFadden said the city manager had to edit the report for "accuracy" but "I don't think it's a reflection on my abilities."
