First Baptist To Observe Choir Day Sunday

CHAPEL HILL — Dr. Roland Carter, professor of music at Hampton Institute, Hampton, Virginia, will be the guest speaker for the annual Choir Day service at First Baptist Church Sunday, April 18 at 11 a.m. Music will be presented by the combined choirs of First Baptist under the direction of Miss Rochelle Tucker, a student at UNC. A reception, for special guests invited by the music committee, will be held at the home of Mrs. Laura Reaves immediately following the service. At 6 p.m., the Junior Choir, under the direction of Mrs. Lattice Vickers Davis, will present a concert. Misses Kathy Atwater and Cathy Ross will assist. Dr. J.R. Manley is pastor of First Baptist Church.

The 106 persons nominated for recognition this year were studied by a three-member panel of judges, and they determined who the seven top volunteers would be. Volunteer of the year awards are given in the following categories:
* Youth, for volunteers 22-years-old and younger.
* Senior, for volunteers 60-years-old and older.
* After Hours, for employed persons who volunteer free time.
* Leader, for volunteer administrators or organizers.
* Concerned Individual, for persons who take it upon themselves to help someone on a one-on-one basis.
* Employee, for volunteer nominated by his or her employer for valuable work done in the community.
* General, for volunteers whose contributions are not covered in any of the other categories.

Noting that many newcomers characterize Durham as a "caring city," Mrs. Moore says that two of the city's strongest volunteer resources are a strong base of middle-class residents, black and white, and two universities that supply a much-needed group of student volunteers. "There are needs for retired people, students and employed persons to

we are realizing that volunteerism must be seen in this broader view." The Volunteer Services Bureau, a Durham United Way funded agency, is the city's "clearinghouse." Agencies and programs that use volunteers, about 125 of them locally, work through the bureau to locate and recruit volunteers. On the other hand, persons who want to volunteer contact the bureau to see where they can work. In its tenth year, the bureau gets the most of its annual budget, just a little more than \$30,000 this year, from the United Way. The bureau also has two small services contracts, one with the Durham County

Department of Social Services, and another with the N.C. School of Math and Science. According to Mrs. Moore, Durham's volunteer community is growing, both from a "need" point of view, and in the services area. "Certain public agencies, such as schools and the department of social services, have always used volunteers," Mrs. Moore said, "but some other public agencies have used volunteers less frequently. But with the budgetary cutbacks on the federal level, I anticipate that more and more public agencies will turn more to volunteer services." She also noted that traditionally volunteers have been the backbone of many private non-profit agencies, such as the Red Cross and the American Cancer Society, and that this use will continue and likely will expand as well. There is a wide range of services that volunteers can provide, according to Mrs. Moore, and almost anyone can serve.
