**Duke Physician Says Measles  
Almost Eradicated In U.S.**

In case you didn't know it, very few American kids get measles anymore.

"This once inevitable childhood disease has almost been eradicated in this country," said Dr. Samuel L. Katz, chairman of Duke University Medical Center's Department of Pediatrics. Katz's laboratory work in the late 1950's led to the production of the vaccine which has cut the incidence of measles by 99.4 per cent.

"A case of measles is so rare in the U.S. that we use slides at the medical center to teach young physicians what the rash looks like," Katz said. "Officials at the Center for Disease Control predict it is likely this country will have seen its last case of measles by October of this year."

Widespread federal immunization programs are mainly responsible for the dramatic decrease in measles in the U.S., Katz said. Since the prevalent use of the vaccine began in the late 1960's, the number of cases has decreased at a steady rate, except for one period in the 1970's when federal funds were reduced.

"During that period the number of immunization programs sponsored by the government decreased, and there was related rise in the number of measles cases," Katz said. "But once the funds were reinstated in 1972 and immunization programs resumed, we once again made steady progress."

Last year officials at the U.S. Centers for Disease Control reported only 3,000 cases of

ed to the regional semifinals in girls 3-A basketball. Jordan tied for first place in 3-A girls swimming, and came in second in boys swimming. Watauga and Jordan each received 25 points for participating in all five sanctioned sports.

Chapel Hill, a two-time winner of the Wachovia Cup, is a strong leader in 4-A competition with 335½ points. Its nearest competitors are Sanderson High in Raleigh with 270 points, South Mecklenburg near Charlotte with 235 points and Greensboro Grimsley with 228 points.

Chapel Hill won the state championship in girls swimming and came in fourth in boys swimming. The school was the state runner-up in boys basketball, and advanced to the regional semifinals in girls basketball. Sanderson won the state 4-A championship in boys swimming, and came in second in girls swimming and wrestling. South Mecklenburg finished sixth in 4-A wrestling and eighth in girls swimming. Grimsley finished second in boys swimming and took seventh place in wrestling and girls swimming. All four schools received 25 points for fielding teams in all five sanctioned sports.

All schools which finish in the top eight positions (plus any ties) in a state championship event receive Wachovia Cup points. In events such as track where 4-A, 3-A, 2-A and 1-A schools all compete together, Wachovia Cup points are awarded based on the school's standing against other schools in its own classification. If there are fewer than eight schools from a classification in the event, only those schools which are represented are eligible to receive Wachovia Cup points.

measles in the U. S. — the lowest number on record. But Katz said he is troubled by proposed cutbacks in the 1983 federal immunization programs.

"I am concerned that 'Reagonomics' might halt some of the progress we've made in controlling not only measles, but other communicable childhood diseases such as whooping cough and polio" Katz said.

He cited probable cuts in federal immunization grants (from \$24.5

million in fiscal 1981 to \$21.8 million in fiscal 1982) as threats to measles eradication. State and local governments are expected to pick up the slack, Katz said, but they are hard-pressed for funds.

Although measles has been nearly eradicated in this country, Katz said on a worldwide scale measles still kills over a million and a half children a year.

"For developing countries of the world, measles is still a serious

health problem," he said.

In some underdeveloped countries, measles is the leading cause of death for children under five years of age, he said.

Measles can have severe complications such as pneumonia, diarrhea, encephalitis (brain inflammation) and permanent brain damage in some children.

Unfortunately, less developed nations lack the resources to finance large-scale immunization programs," he said. "But if those countries will have to make a commitment to eliminate communicable diseases such as measles for which we have vaccines."

Katz was one of two recent four-day meeting of world health leaders in Washington, D.C. to discuss international eradication efforts. "Eradicating measles world-wide is our next goal," he said. "It will require millions of immunizations in the 1980's and 1990's."
