The Rt. Rev. Richard Allen Hildebrand, presiding bishop of the First Episcopal District of the African Methodist Episcopal Church, will be preacher at the annual ecumenical services of worship, set for 7:30 p.m., Sunday, June 27. Bishop Hildebrand, who lives in Philadelphia, was elected bishop in 1972 and has headed the First District that includes the northeastern U.S. and Bermuda, since 1976.

Author-theologian Martip E. Marty will be the main speaker at the annual General Assembly Breakfast, set for 6:45 a.m. Monday, June 28. A professor at the University of Chicago, the Lutheran minister is associate editor of *The Christian Century*, editor of the newsletter *Context*, and co-editor of *Church History*.

Before the meeting itself begins, a Pre-Assembly Conference on Mission is expected to involve a large number of commissioners and guests. Scheduled from 7:30 p.m., Monday, June 21, to 1 p.m., the following day, the conference will include Bible studies led by Ms. Gwen Cashmore of Geneva, Switzerland, and will focus on mission undertakings in Africa, Europe, the Middle East, East Asia, Latin America and the Caribbean, South Asia and China, and North America.

Numerous other activities are planned. Tickets will be required for some of the events. Most will be available at General Assembly facilities in the Hartford Civic Center.

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**MEDICAL JOURNAL**

According to a recent broadcast sponsored by the Columbia Presbyterian Medical Center and The Prudential Insurance Company, over-use of modern nasal sprays may do harm to one's health. Dr. Malcolm Schvey, an ear, nose and throat specialist at the Columbia Presbyterian Medical Center says, "There's certainly no objection to using nasal sprays for relief from colds and allergies for two or three days. But what very often happens is people start to use them and then continue to use them for an extended period of time." Dr. Schvey says the effect of the sprays is to constrict blood vessels in the nose, causing the mucous membrane to become thinner and the nasal passages wider, making it easier to breathe. This relief continues for as long as effect of the spray lasts. "As time goes on, you get to a situation where the problem is being caused by the spray itself," says Dr. Schvey. "The nasal spray has allowed for a 'rebound' phenomenon with the patient using the spray more and getting less relief." Nasal spray dependence can be avoided by careful use of these products for no longer than the labels suggest. Dr. Schvey advises, "If someone runs into a situation where he's used the spray for a few days and has not received any relief, he should see a specialist who is prepared to take care of this kind of problem."

**Corona Street Club**

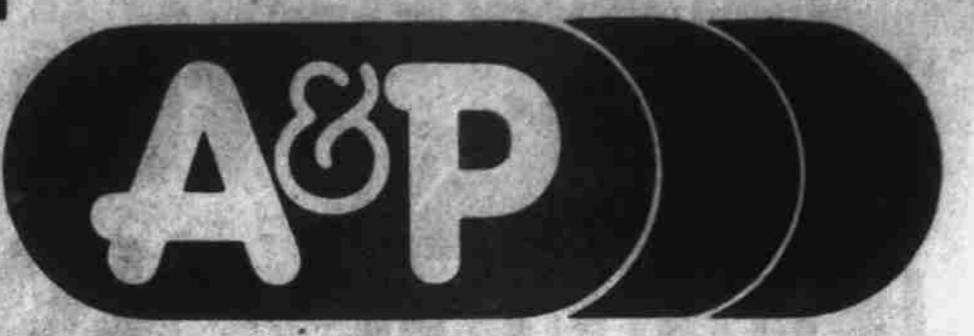
Mrs. Alberta Leak was hostess to the May 22 meeting of the Corona Street Community Club. Mrs. Myrtle McMillan was devotional leader.
