eight, with one, Tommy Thompson parked one over-the short right field fence and the Bulls went up 4-3. The crowd, knowing that the Durham magic flumber was now "One", screamed deliriously as the Bulls won 6-3.
 On June 14, Durham's weather was picture perfect. The game time temperature was 80 degrees and over 3500

fans were there to see the Bulls win the title at home.
 The players wanted this one badly. Roy North, the previous evening's starting pitcher, said the night before: "This team probably has less talent than the Durham teams of 1980 and '81, but we play well together. We feel that this pennant is ours. We want to win it here tomorrow night."
 The Pilots, now with wounded egos but still proud, proved that though hopes were slim, the race wasn't over yet.
 The Bulls scored one run in the first. But it

meant almost nothing because in a nightmarish fourth inning during which the Bulls committed three errors, and couldn't seem to get anyone out, Penninsula went on top 8-1.
 The Bulls, who also have tremendous pride, got off the canvas in the bottom of the fifth.
 Mike Garcia hit a bases loaded homer to narrow the count to 8-5, and an elderly black fan screamed, "NEVER count us out!!!"
 The Penninsula bench had an "Oh, No! Here we go again look," but they won this wild game 9-7.
 But the same Bulls who had returned home

just four days earlier, clinging to a slim half game lead, went back on the road needing just one victory to sew up the first half pennant. They did it in Lynchburg.
 A bus load of fans accompanied their beloved Durhamites to Lynchburg and with the game (and pennant safely in hand) they screamed, "Let's Go Bulls!!!"

 law, defendants must have charges against them dealt with within 90 days, following arrest. One courthouse source, it is easier to accept a guilty plea to a lesser charge than to try to go to trial, particularly when the time limit is close to running out.
 So what this all means as a practical matter is that the selection of a district attorney boils down to choosing almost on the basis of personality because there are almost no objective ways to determine when an incumbent DA has done a good job, or to decide if a challenger will do a better job.

 the law.
 She says that during her own two years on the bench, she has tried to emphasize the problem-solving approach.
 I enjoy working with people," she said, "trying to help them solve their problems. But my biggest frustration is that I sometimes try so hard to solve a problem that just doesn't have a realistic solution."
 One such example is the fact that North Carolina judges can order convicted offenders to pay restitution to the victims of their crimes. But she notes that many offenders don't have jobs, and few marketable skills and therefore are not good candidates.
 "The bottom line," she said, "is that the victim still does not get paid back."
 To address this problem, Judge Galloway has started a program called "Probation Challenge." In this program, a convicted offender without a high school diploma can be put on probation provid-

ed he agrees to go to school to get either a diploma, or a General Educational Development (GED) high school equivalency certificate. Periodic checks are made to make sure the offender is doing well in school. Poor grades, poor attendance, or other problems are grounds for revoking the probation.
 "The goal of the program," Judge Galloway explained, "is to help both the offender and the community, because if the individual can become more productive, not only does the victim get restitution, the whole community benefits."
 And so the question in Durham's District Court race boils down to how the community defines "justice" and "law and order."
 On the one hand, it can be defined as "a firm application of the law." On the other hand, it can be defined as "helping people solve problems in ways that benefit the individual and the community as well."
